Cut Corners and Cut Costs Pullets vs Hens

From present indications, the year 1946 will not be a year of high profits for poultrymen in general. Feed costs will remain high for at least the first half of the year—maybe longer. Egg prices will be lower than last year, and possibly at support levels until out into the fall months.

These two facts alone do not mean eggs will be a losing proposition. Profit in the egg business means just one thing: producing eggs for less money than they sell for. Certainly it is not wise to go out of the business just because it doesn't look like a gold mine for a few months. If everyone did that in their own business, this glorious country wouldn't be any better than a desert island in the Arctic Ocean in three months.

No, we must do as all other businesses are doing: convert to peace time standards. Thank the Good Lord, our hens won't go on a strike as other business men's producing employees are doing. They are smart enough to know that the more they produce, the better it will be for everybody, but especially for them. If a hen doesn't produce, she loses her head, (or should), and it is too bad this practice couldn't be extended into other fields.

Nationally, we are frightened to death of INFLATION. The Flour Mill believes the best way to avoid inflation is to produce more goods. Certainly, to create shortages, whether by a "planned economy," or by refusal of a producing class to produce will NEVER hold down prices. Neither will ceilings hold down prices when popular goods OF ANY KIND are scarce. This has been proved hundreds of times by the "black markets" of the past few years; in America and in all other parts of the world. But that's getting into politics, which we never intended to do when we started this article.

One way to cut costs of eggs is to increase production. One way to get more eggs from a hundred chickens is to see to it they are ALL pullets. Pullets under identical conditions will lay from 20 to 30% more eggs in a year than old hens. At the same time, they will eat very little, if any more feed than the same number of hens. The extra feed required for the extra production is about offset by the extra body weight of the hens which must be maintained.

Add to this, the fact that a pullet can be brought into production for approximately the amount realized from the sale of a yearling hen, and about the only good reason we can see for carrying over yearlings is to use them for breeding stock. The feed eaten by an old hen in the three months she takes to molt is nearly enough to bring a pullet into maturity.

Now is certainly a good time to order a nice bunch of good, well bred chicks, to provide for an all-pullet flock for the coming season. Due to the fact that demand is slow, you can get good stock, and at nearly any time you want it. Take our advice; order some good chicks NOW. Don't carry old hens thru a 3-month molt on high priced feed.
