"As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world." (Jesus). Increased Scope Of Home Nursing Course Is Planned

Plans for increasing the scope of the home nursing and community health class at the Roseburg Senior High School, were made this week by a planning committee which met in the office of Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott. The class is taught by Mrs. Mel Ingram, high school nurse, with the cooperation of Miss Helen Dempster of the Kellogg Foundation, and the State Department of Education.

Attending the meeting were Dr. L. A. Dillard, dentist; Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer; M. M. Nelson, representing the Red Cross; Dr. Otto Schaffer, psychiatrist at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital; Mrs. Leroy Hatt, representing mothers of the school; Omer J. Monger, principal at the Senior High School, and Elliott.

From last year's class, composed largely of senior girls, five have entered nurses' training this year. Already the class has covered its text book assignments, Elliott said, and is participating in actual assistance at the county health clinic, and as nurses' aides in Mercy Hospital.

Girls' Aid Appreciated

Dr. Wainwright stated that "were it not for the assistance of these girls," the clinic would be greatly handicapped in its operation, since the nursing staff of the county health clinic has been reduced to one nurse. The girls have made it possible, Dr. Wainwright said, to give as many as 250 immunization injections in one afternoon.

"Great possibilities" were seen by Dr. Dillard for the class in the training of dental assistants and technicians, while Mrs. Hatt suggested that child care and home nursing training would be invaluable. Dr. Schaffer felt that the attitude of this class toward the mentally sick was "very commendable," and should be extended "throughout the entire student body."

Plans were made by Monger and Elliott, in conference with Miss Dempster, for increasing the size of the class. Roseburg High School is one of nine schools in Oregon with such a class aided by the Kellogg Foundation.

Edwards Theater, Reedsport, Sold

REEDSPORT—Announcement was made here today of the sale of the Edwards Theater, which for the past 20 years has been owned and operated by Harriet Edwards, to Mr. and Mrs. Earl Baltazar and the latter's brother, Ralph Baltazar, all formerly of Rainier, Ore.

No price has been announced in the purchase, but it has long been known that the property was valued in excess of \$50,000. It includes the theatre building, an apartment adjoining, and three lots used for parking. The sale of this theatre marks the passing from the business field of what was probably the only woman-owned and operated motion picture theater in Oregon. Mrs. Edwards, a pioneer in her field, has been ill for a number of years although in active management of the theatre. She was ably assisted by her sister, Bess Richards, who has taken care of the details of active management, while Miss Myrtle Machael has been the projectionist for more than five years. 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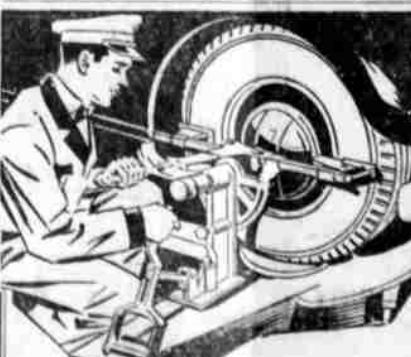
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
