American Legion Auxiliary Activities

During World War I, a plaque was presented to that village for it was there that the name "America" was born. Following the present war, the only thing intact after numerous bombings was the plaque, still hanging where it had been placed twenty-five years before by Major John Emery. Roseburg and nearby units have been assigned 7-year-old Philippe Train. To him will be sent regularly 11-pound box of clothing, vitamin tablets, powdered milk, etc.

Mrs. Templar also stated that from this war there are now 721,000 sick and wounded needing hospitalization. The Legion of Oregon, she stated, now has a membership of 20,000 and the Oregon auxiliary membership will soon equal this number. The national president's project this year will be to support a \$25,000 research program to discover the causes and cure of rheumatic fever in children.

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Congressmen Approve Bonneville Basic Rate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Northwestern congressmen have hailed Secretary of Interior Ickes' approval of Bonneville Power Administration's basic \$17.50 rate as pointing to continued industrialization of the region.

Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) said the action will "unquestionably be a major factor in interesting industry in utilizing our hydro-electric power." Sen. Mitchell (D-Wash.) declared it "proves once again the power rates we have been advocating to the industrial world are based upon natural advantages and not upon any artificial situation created by federal financing as some critics of Grand Coulee power are trying to contend."

Rep. Horan (R-Wash.) declared the audit "proves our low power rates are proper and further development of the Columbia River is warranted."

Atom Research Can't Be Strangled, Senator Says

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Efforts of Congress to control use of atomic energy were compared today by Senator B. B. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) as parallel to imaginary problems if the world had attempted to control

electricity when Franklin discovered its emergent characteristics.

After visiting the Hanford atomic project at Richland, Wash., yesterday, the Iowa Senator said "it must be remembered that what we do and the framework of the law we set up is only a temporary thing and should be changed as need arises."

He explained it would be impossible to "strangle atomic research." Hickenlooper will address a Lincoln day banquet here tonight.
