Roy O. Kelly, 54, died early today at the Veterans hospital here following a long illness. Born in Salem, Ore., he came to the South Deer Creek community in 1919, residing there continuously since that date.

He served in the first World War for 18 months. He was hospitalized for five months from the effects of gas suffered while in combat action in France.

Surviving are the widow, Rose Kelly, teacher in the South Deer Creek school; a daughter, Rose Jean Kelly, student in Roseburg Senior High school; two brothers, D. H. Kelly, Roseburg; Ernest Kelly, Fresno, Calif., and two sisters, Mrs. Perry Wiggins, Salem, Ore., and Mrs. Woods Baker, Ore.

Funeral services have been tentatively set for 2 P. M. Monday at the Roseburg Funeral Home. Services, conducted by the Rev. H. P. Seance, will be concluded at the Veterans cemetery.

Mrs. Ella McCoy Claimed by Death

Mrs. Ella May Roadman McCoy, 63, a life-long resident of Douglas County, died Wednesday following a long period of ill health. She was born at Oakland, Ore., March 10, 1882, receiving her education in the Oakland schools and Wilbur academy. U. S. Soldier Convicted Of Prison Camp Cruelty

LONDON, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Sgt. Hudson H. Smith of Cumberland, Ky., first of 12 defendants to be tried on charges of cruelty to American Army personnel at Lichfield prison camp, was found guilty by a United States court-martial today.

The court sentenced the 33-year-old former coal miner to dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances and three years at hard labor.

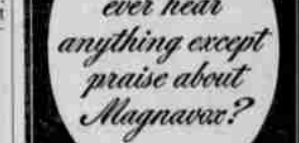
