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With the end of the War, we thought and hoped things would ease up a little. Instead, the clouds of uncertainty are blacker now than at any time in the last four years.

Just a few out of many of the agencies we have had to get along with: The W. F. A., who told us how much of this and that we could have, then never were able to get it for us. We were, and are, limited to 30-day inventory of proteins, with a boxcar situation so tight we couldn't get delivery, even if we could find the protein.

The O. D. T. who told us we couldn't deliver feed more than fifteen miles, when over half of our customers live farther than that from town. Those guys back in Washington seem to think the "Wide Open Spaces" mean a couple city blocks.

The W. P. B. who wouldn't let us have a half inch nut to fix a pellet machine without an Act of Congress. Nor a board to patch a hole in the floor.

The Labor Relations Board, which wouldn't let us give our employees a raise in pay so they could stay with us, instead of hitting it for the Woods or the Shipyards and the big money. But who could, and did seek us for thousands of dollars in retroactive pay on some technicalities regarding interstate business.

The Internal Revenue Department which collects your taxes and ours, and which makes it necessary for even a farmer to hire a certified accountant to fill out the income tax papers. Imagine then, how much extra bookkeeping is entailed in a large business!

Thank the Good Lord, we didn't have to count out Red and Blue stamps! But we did have our troubles with several different branches of the O. P. A. And still do! We had ceiling prices. And still do.

And any time you think ceiling prices have been an unmitigated blessing. Brother, you can guess again. They have helped in some cases and in others they have cost you plenty.

With all these things, and many others, we have coped, and have managed to keep a sack of feed available for you nearly every time you needed it. You have increased production, and we have, by devious means, found your requirements for the increase.

But we have reached the end of the trail. Due to ceiling price regulations, we can't get barley and oats. Due to weather conditions, ceiling prices, distilleries and other circumstances, we can't get more than enough corn to sprinkle the scratch and mash. But we could get a little wheat—until now.

Wheat has always been a basic ingredient of mixed feeds on the Pacific Coast. And always will be, if normal conditions EVER RETURN. This is not a corn country. We don't have those nasty, hot, humid nights they enjoy (?) in the corn belt. But we can, and do, raise a surplus of wheat, which is used in poultry, dairy and turkey feeds. It is not even raising wheat, really, but is known principally as "FEED WHEAT." But, it is headed for Europe to feed the hungry hordes that made war on the World back in 1939.

Folks—FRIENDS, we don't know what to tell you. We usually have been plenty free

with our advice. It was free, so you didn't have to take it. But today, we haven't any to give.

If we were in your place, we wouldn't make any definite plans that couldn't be altered to fit changing conditions. Your cattle, sheep and hogs can get by on hay and grass, maybe, until another harvest. If you are in the turkey or chicken business don't lose hope. The battle still goes on, and maybe we can make the fair-haired boys see the light. If not, somebody will certainly get mighty hungry for butter, cheese, eggs and fried chicken, not to mention roast turkey next Christmas.

We will still be allowed enough wheat to get by on for awhile. Before it is gone, we hope to get these new hobbles loosened up to where we can still walk. Please don't get stampeded. Remember that this country is geared for livestock and poultry. We can't quit these crops without serious consequences.
