He adds: "It is imperative that production and great volume be achieved. . . . Production is our salvation. . . . Production (the should have added COMPETITION) will do away with the necessity for government controls."

His words are pious. They are academically TRUE. But if his DEEDS are weak, the battle at new line he calls upon us to defend now at all costs will end in just another defeat and we'll have to fall back to ANOTHER (and of course HIGH ER) line beyond.

All history teaches us that inflation can't be licked with WORDS.

NOT in any spirit of "I told you so," but merely to keep the situation clear in our minds, this seems to be the time to do a little reviewing.

When V.J. Day came along (a little unexpectedly) there was already a fairly well-established wage-price line, worked out by wartime experience and maintained by wartime controls. President Truman DIDN'T HOLD IT. There are statements on pretty good authority that he even encouraged labor leaders to demand sharply higher wages on the theory that industry could afford to pay these higher wages without increasing prices.

It didn't work out satisfactorily. The present DEADLOCK in industry ensued and became so menacing as to force the President to devise his new wage-price formula in the hope of breaking the deadlock and getting the country back to work.

That is what he is trying to do now.

All this isn't said in anger, or even in sharp criticism. It is quite possible that Truman sincerely believed that this was the time to FORCE a trial of the theory of higher wages without higher prices.

It just didn't work. Deadlock and stagnation followed. Truman's new "formula" amounts to acknowledgment that for the PRESENT at least we must pay higher prices if we are going to have higher wages.

Let's give him credit for being willing to learn from experience.

WHAT he hopes is that if we can get production started in a BIG WAY immense volume will BRING COSTS DOWN and COMPETITION will bring down prices.

It is an entirely reasonable expectation. That is exactly what happens when the American system of mass production and COMPETITION is working smoothly, with no monkey-wrenches being thrown into the machinery.

BE CAREFUL WITH FIRE

Charles V. Stanton. Six lives have been taken by fire in Douglas County within the past few days. Five persons died from burns suffered in a fire at Sutherlin. A four-year-old girl was burned to death at Glendale and the father is in the hospital suffering from critical injury.

Scarcely a day passes without the telegraph wire recounting loss of life from fire. It seems that fatalities of this type are increasing enormously, although we have not seen statistics on this subject recently and it may be our conclusion is based upon frequency of news concerning fire fatalities.

There are good reasons why we can expect more deaths from fire than would normally be the case. One reason is that of overcrowding. Throughout the nation there is a critical housing shortage. Families are doubling up in residences. The greater the number of occupants using household facilities, the greater the danger of fire.

Also to be considered is the fact that normal replacements of stoves, furnaces and other equipment have been lacking. Flues have not been given attention as in prewar years. Electric circuits are overloaded in crowded homes, and old equipment is in use.

Many factors contribute to cause fires, but by far the most outstanding is carelessness. We all know it is dangerous to use gasoline, coal oil, fuel oil, or any other combustible liquid to kindle fires, yet two houses were destroyed in Sutherlin within a time lapse of four hours last week from one of these agencies. Fortunately no one was injured in one home, but funeral services are being conducted today for five victims of the other blaze and two orphan boys, five and 10 years of age, are the only survivors of that terrible tragedy.

Fire prevention is given much emphasis in the press of the nation almost continuously. Fire Prevention Week is an annual event when special stress is given the subject. Yet, despite all efforts to keep the public conscious of the fire menace, news columns must report day-after-day an increasing toll of lives.

It behooves all of us to realize that our own lives are continually in danger from fire. We should be mindful, too, that we must maintain careful guard of our heating and cooking equipment, our electric appliances, and our flues. We should seek out and remove fire hazards, such as rubbish-strewn attics and basements. We should ascertain that electric circuits are not overloaded. But most of all, we should guard carefully our habits. Tragic examples of loss of life, serious injury, and property damage should serve as reminders that equal danger confronts each of us; that a tragedy identical to those we read about in our newspapers could strike any home anywhere through one act of carelessness.
