

Achiu Faces Tough Task Saturday in Tilt With Dawson

Walter Achiu, the Chinese wrestler, will have 100 per cent backing from Douglas county mat followers here at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night when he attempts to do something locally no other matman has done—defeat Bull Dawson.

Achiu, armed with all of the Oriental cunning at his command, will be topped in size, strength and youth, but his long years of experience and the added threat of his ill-lashed may be enough to topple the rough and tough Alaskan. On top of all that, Matchmaker Don Owen has offered Achiu a \$100 bonus if he stops Dawson. Local fans have been hoping that Owen discovers some matman capable of defeating the villain.

Although the Dawson-Achiu match has top billing on the weekly program, there will be considerable interest in a return engagement between two popular and sensational scientific wrestlers—Al Szasz and Pierre LaBelle.

The semi-final bout will be in marked contrast to the inevitable brawl in the headliner. Both are great fundamental mat masters and they battled to a spectacular 20-minute deadlock here last week.

Szasz, the young Hungarian who returned to the northwest recently after several years of main-event action in the mid-west, has been pointing for a championship shot at Paavo Katonan and the coast light-heavyweight title. In LaBelle, the tall-

ented Frenchman, Szasz has an opponent capable of meeting the best matmen in the business on even terms.

Katonan, incidentally, is expected to be on the shelf for a couple of weeks—recovering from a badly gashed eye suffered in a match here last week against Dawson, won by the ruffian on a technicality.

A three-round boxing exhibition, featuring local mittmen, will open the program at 8:30 o'clock.

Elton Owen will referee all three matches.

Questionnaire on Institute Sent Douglas Teachers

Douglas County school teachers are to decide this week whether they wish to attend a two-day institute on the campus of the Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland next summer, before the opening of school, by answering the questionnaire being sent to them by Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent.

Up to five days of in-service training are required of all teachers in the school system, Mrs. Gorrell said. Usually, the teacher institutes have been of only two days' duration, because of the greater distances teachers must travel in Douglas County than in other counties in the state, she said.

All teachers who have been teaching with emergency certificates must take a two-week course next summer, if they wish to continue in their present positions, Mrs. Gorrell said.

Dr. Elmo Stephenson, president of the Southern Oregon College, is offering the two-week course of school, Mrs. Gorrell said, and would combine with it the two to five days of in-service training required of all the teachers in the system.

If Douglas County teachers ap-

prove the plan, Mrs. Gorrell said, they are to return the questionnaire without delay.
