Guess What.

Feed shortage; feed surplus. Egg famine; egg surplus. Too much turkey; not enough turkey. Wheat crop failures; huge shipments of wheat to Germany. Pork unavailable in U. S.; 1,600,000,000 pounds meat and fat slated for Europe.

Due to low stocks of feed, particularly proteins and wheat, the Government requests reduction of 15% poultry, 10% turkeys, etc. Government "Outlook Report" just out says: "Supplies of feed concentrates for 1945-46 feeding season total 158.8 thousand tons, compared to 159.4 thousand tons last year. Animal consuming unit 147 million, compared to 147 million last year. Supply per animal unit 1.08, compared to 1.08 last year, 1.08 in 1943, .95 in 1944 and 1.03 for the five-year pre-war average."

Looks like the bureaucrats should get together, eh, what? But one other thing they do say, and we know is correct: "The Coast states did not increase egg production during the war as much as other regions. This region has become a deficit-producing area during the past five years."

It appears there is only one thing to do. That is for all of us to continue our regular jobs, whether it is sawing wood or producing eggs or turkeys. It is wise for producers to cut poultry production 10%, but that will be done by the backyarders and the speculators, which means that the real poultryman must keep in the business to protect himself.

If we cut down to the point that consumers can't get eggs, they are going to drift to other foods, and we can then get them back on eggs again only by selling them eggs at ruinous prices. It seems wise to keep egg consumption up to the present 390 per capita, and that takes lots of hens. Order the chicks today.

Turkeys.

We would give one of our false eye teeth to know the answer to one question: Are tur-

key breeders going to market in other sections as they are here in Douglas County?

We have tested 12,038 turkey breeders, and know positively that 4323 of them have already gone to the place where good turkeys go when they die. All were good turkeys, and that many have gone through local killing plants since we tested them.

We have reason to believe this percentage holds true for all of Douglas County, but don't know how it is in other sections. But one thing is certain—if you are planning on ordering eggs or turkeys from some of the high class flocks here in Douglas County the home of the world's best turkeys, you better get your order in quick. The flock you figured on for your poultry may be slated for the knife, too.

More turkeys were tested this season than ever before. But if over 35% have already been killed, and thousands more will be soon, besides the thousands of eggs that have already gone to bakeries, instead of hatcheries, it is easy to see there may be much more of a reduction than even the fair haired boys have asked.

Like Vitamins?

Vitamins are little things we can't see, but without which we get sick and die. Your chicks grow and keep healthy. The mature birds need them for production. The Wheat Situation.

There is nothing new and definite about it, but our Oregon Director of Agriculture

Peterson talked by long distance to Sec'y of Agriculture Anderson a few days ago, and was given no encouragement on the protein problems, but did receive some encouragement that the Northwest MIGHT be granted permission to use up to 15% more wheat than other sections of the country.

We think it would be a swell idea for every poultryman, turkeyman and dairyman to write Guy Cordon and Harris Ellsworth, telling them our views, and stating the facts of the case. These men can help out wonderfully if they know they have the backing of their constituents. Even the politicians wake up when a bunch of votes looms up on the horizon.

Green Feed.

At the risk of becoming monotonous, we again advise that you plan on lots of green feed for your livestock and poultry. Talk about vitamins, and who doesn't, these days? There is practically no vitamin yet discovered that isn't found in growing green feed. That's why cows give more and better milk when on good pasture.

If there is a feed shortage coming, the best thing you can do in the way of insurance is to plant crops that can be used for green feeds. If there ISN'T a feed shortage, the best thing you can have is plenty of green feed. Makes slick chicks, fat calves, juicy lambs and plump poult. We have the seed.
