If the recommendation is accepted all threat of a city power tieup will be removed.

The union represents 243 city light department employees who threatened to strike for a wage increase.

The chance, however remote, that Springfield would beat Eugene, means that the Indians and Axemen would play off on a "neutral floor."

Rennie Young of Roseburg still has the chance, also somewhat slim, of winning the individual scoring record for the league. It's held now by Gordon Neideigh of Cottage Grove. Young would have to score 32 points against Eugene to beat out Neideigh's record of 168 points for 10 games. Young has 137 points for nine games. Neideigh did score 32 points in one game this season, again Springfield.

If Eugene should lose both tonight's game and the one with Springfield, it would mean that the Indians and the Axemen would try for the championship on another school's floor. The home floor is usually good for 10 or 12 points. Omer Moner will ask for Cottage Grove's floor, he said this week, if the possibility arises that Roseburg and Eugene do play off for the district crown.
