The water dissolves the alkaline salts in the soil, and since the lakes have no outlet, save that afforded by the sun's evaporation, they become very bitter. Future Plane Speed of 1,000 M. P. H. Predicted

BOSTON, Feb. 26.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, asserting planes now building "will fly very shortly" at speeds approaching 1,000 miles per hour, forecast yesterday that "the air weapons of the future" would be atomic-propelled, long-range stratosphere rockets speeding faster than sound—probably with atom bomb warheads.

"Pilotless, wingless, gyro-stabilized, rocket-propelled air weapons already have achieved speeds of around 2,500 miles per hour and we may anticipate that the air weapons of the future will also be radio-controlled and radar-directed," the one-time Tokyo raid leader said in a speech at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

"They will be capable of traveling great distance at supersonic speed, in the stratosphere, and will probably have an atomic warhead and may even employ atomic energy as a propulsive force."

(At 35,000 feet, sound travels at almost 700 miles per hour.)

OPA Price Boost on Fir Unwarranted, IWA Says

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26.—(AP)—The CIO International Woodworkers of America yesterday said the recent OPA price order on Douglas fir and southern pine gives increases "entirely unwarranted."

The union's statement, issued by President James Fadling, declared that the order "gives producers more money on the items for which they have a market. It reduces the prices on special war items for which the market has sharply shrunk, if not disappeared. Therefore, it increases the realization more than appears from a superficial scanning of the order."

The statement said the union

opposes a "merry-go-round of wage increase leading to price boosts and price boosts forcing us to ask for further wage increases."

Lumber industry leaders have denied that the OPA order results in material price increases.
