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Vandenburg Urges Plain U. S. Talk to Match Red Stand

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27. — (P) — Senator Vandenburg (R-Mich.) called today for a vigorously plain-spoken American foreign policy that will match Russia's in firmness.

Reporting to the Senate on his work as a delegate to the United Nations meeting in London, the chairman of the Republican Senatorial conference told his colleagues that the world today is asking: "What is Russia up to now?"

Without attempting to answer that question specifically, Vandenburg said in a prepared address that upon the answer may depend the future fate of world efforts to keep the peace.

It would be entirely futile, the Michigan Senator said, "to blink the fact that two great, rival ideologies—Democracy in the west and Communism in the east—here find themselves face to face with the desperate need for mutual understanding in finding common ground upon which to strive for peace for both."

Plain Speaking Needed

But he said the United States and Russia "can live together in reasonable harmony if the United States speaks as plainly upon all occasions as Russia does; if the United States just as vigorously sustains its own purposes and ideals upon all occasions as Russia does; if we abandon the miserable fiction, often encouraged by our fellow travelers, that we somehow jeopardize the peace if our candor is as firm as Russia's; and if we assume a moral leadership in which we have too frequently allowed to lapse."

Vandenburg added that "the situation calls for patience and good will, but not for vacillation."

"The United States, he said, can speak with extraordinary power because it has 'no ulterior designs against any of its neighbors anywhere on earth.'"

"We need but one rule," he declared. "What is right? Where is justice? There let America take her stand."

Greatest of All Nazi Power Czars Nabbed by Yanks

FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 27. — (P) — A phantom German armament maker described by an American investigator as the "greatest single power behind the Nazi war machine"—a behind the scenes force far bigger than Krupp—has been caught and unmasked by American occupation authorities.

The magnate, whose fabulous \$400,000,000 secret industrial empire previously was whispered among a few, was identified by authorities as Friedrich Flick, 62, a steel and coal producer whose name was virtually unknown abroad or among millions of Germans.

Full details of the dealings which made Flick one of the wealthiest men in Nazi Germany still are under investigation by a Treasury and War Department de-cartelization team headed by Josef March, Jr., New York.

"We consider Flick a greater criminal than Krupp for he grew

with the Nazi regime and seized more personal economic power than Krupp ever held," March said. He added that his team would recommend the indictment of Flick as a war criminal at the second war crimes trial.

Arch Power Holder

March described the mystery man who worked under a cloak of anonymity as possessor of "the greatest economic power of any single industrialist in Nazi Germany."

He said that Flick, in 12 years of Nazism, built up controls vaster than those it took the Krupp generations to seize in three wars starting with the 1870 French-German conflict.

Flick's octopus-like holdings, which were built up from confiscated French, Czechoslovak and Russian properties and forced sales of Jewish plants and mines are now being smashed by the Allies.

Flick himself is being held in the bleak Preungshausen prison near Frankfurt for questioning. His 28-year-old son, Ernst, who was pulled out of German Army service by the personal intervention of Hermann Goering and made head of a stolen French steel plant at Lorraine, is under house arrest.

Key directors of Flick's giant combine also are in jail.

Simpson, Medford Coach, Takes Boss Job at Salem High

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 27. — (P) — Al Simpson, 29-year-old Medford coach who led the Black Tornado to the state football title in 1944 and whose team was runner-up last year, will become Salem's football coach, the Salem School Board announced last night.

Simpson, who had been serving at Medford during the war while Coach Bill Bowerman was in service, was one of the most sought-after coaches in the state. The board said Simpson is expected to accept formally the Salem offer today, as he already had advised the board he would take the job.

He succeeds Coach Tom Dryman, who has had the job four years. Coach Harold Hawk, who coached football before the war, will remain as basketball and baseball coach.

Simpson, after graduating from Southern Oregon Normal School, went to Ashland in 1943, where he won the state high school basketball title. He also

coached basketball in the two years at Medford, his teams making good records in state tournament play.
