

Hoop Tourney For 16 Teams Opens in Roseburg Friday

Teams that never had a chance against stronger opponents will come into their own, starting tomorrow, as competitors in the Roseburg Invitational Basketball Tournament.

Sixteen teams — 14 games — that's what's in store for local hoop fans at the Junior and Senior High tomorrow, Friday and Saturday in a single-elimination tournament for grade school and smaller high school teams in the county.

On the opening day's schedule, the Myrtle Creek Frosh play Yoncalla Frosh at 4 P. M.; Glendale Varsity and Roseburg Junior High at 8 P. M. These contests are to be on the Senior High court. Days Creek is said to be a slight favorite over Roseburg Junior High.

At the Junior High, these grade schools are scheduled: Junior High 8th Grade and Sutherland at 4 P. M.; Glendale and Lookingglass at 5 P. M.; Glendale and Camas Valley at 7 P. M., and Yoncalla and Riddle at 8 P. M.

Trophies to the high school and grade school division winners are being donated by Joe Martin of Martin's Stationer.

Season tickets to all games are sold for \$1.50 and to students at \$1.00. Omer J. Monger, tournament manager, said. Single session tickets are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students. Saturday night, adults will be admitted for 60 cents and students for 50 cents.

Eugene was very much on the offensive last night. The blue-jerseyed players were off like a shot every time they got a grasp on the ball. Several times they blocked what might have been beautiful field goals for Roseburg.

Rennie Young managed to score three baskets and three free throws.

The Indians closed their season with only three losses in league play, twice to Eugene, once to University High.

The league race winds up Saturday, with Idaho meeting Washington State and Oregon tangling with Oregon State. Losses or wins for the two leaders would

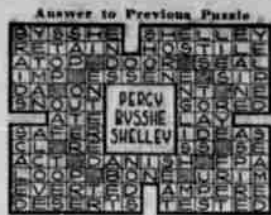

Katonan to Again Battle Dawson in Next Headliner

Bull Dawson, the rough and tough Alaskan, is still the king of professional wrestling in this area, and mat followers are shouting for some matman to stop the sensational string of triumphs being amassed by the villain from the north country.

Matchmaker Don Owen believed he had the answer last week when he signed Walter Achu to meet the red-hatted grappler, but the Chinese jiu-jitsu artist went down to defeat in much the same manner as Dawson's other victims.

So, there was nothing for Owen to do than re-match Dawson against Paavo Katonan, the Pacific Coast light-heavyweight champion. In his last meeting with the villain from Alaska, Katonan suffered a badly gashed eye that gave Dawson a technical triumph. The Finnish matmaster had requested a return engagement and Saturday night, at the Roseburg Armory, he will have his chance for revenge. The coveted coast crown will not be at stake, despite Dawson's demands that Katonan defend his title. Now I don't want to convey the impression that the Germans are eager to renew their assault on the rest of the world, for they definitely are not. One very good reason is that they recognize they are indeed beaten physically. Another is that they are anxious to get ahead with reconstruction.

If the Allies don't take advantage of this temporarily chastened frame of mind by keeping the lid on and trying to create peace-mindedness among the coming generation, then the efforts on the battlefields will have been lost. That's where the friendliness of the youngsters comes in. It's through educating them that German reform must be achieved.

The elderly folk are passing out of the picture. The largely still youthful Germans who were won over by Hitler are lost to the Allies. It is upon the children that peace must be built.

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Wires Guide Blind Man, 99, in Working His Farm Unaided

MOORELAND, Ind.—Ninety-nine-year-old David Rhoades, although blind for 16 years, leads an active life as his farm home near Mooreland, where he lives alone.

When he goes out to the barn to the chores, out to the carpenter shop to make repairs, or to the garden which he tends without help, Rhoades takes a "trolley ride."

His trolleys are rows of kink

haywire strung from the house to each of his habitual destinations. He hooks his cane over the trolley he selects, then follows it exactly to the spot he wants to reach.

"I like to be kinda independent," Rhoades says, and shows what he means by doing all the chores around his farm alone.

He put a new roof on his barn without help. He cooks and bakes for himself. He tends the garden entirely by his sense of touch.

Rhoades' hobby is fixing clocks. He is especially adept at repairing antique wooden clocks, making the parts that need replacing.

He will celebrate his 100th birthday next September 10.

For each day of the continuance of refusal or neglect to file return. PRIVATELY OWNED IMPROVEMENTS ON PUBLIC LANDS: Any privately owned structure or improvement on land owned by the United States is personal property and should be reported as such.

Privately owned improvements situated on land owned by the state or by a county, city or other municipal corporation are real property and should be listed as such.

Give the legal subdivision, section, township and range, on which such improvements are situated; also, the year of construction and the total cost and the true cash value as of January 1 of the current year.

MERCHANDISE AND STOCK IN TRADE: The amount listed should agree with the inventory as shown by the books, including shipping and other charges. Take no discount or other deduction.

FURNITURE, FURNITURE AND EQUIPMENT IN BUSINESS OR COMMERCIAL USE: The true cash value of all furniture and equipment in auto courts, apartments, hotels, offices, and that part of household furniture and equipment used for commercial purposes in rented rooms, etc., should be listed.

The value given should correspond to the cost of replacing with like furniture and equipment (not new), rather than the amount which might be realized from a forced sale.

Household furniture, domestic fixtures, household goods and effects, actually in use as such in homes and dwellings, where not used for business or commercial purposes, are exempt from taxation and should not be reported on this form. Exemption also applies to wearing apparel, watches, jewelry, and similar personal effects actually in use.

The assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any returns herein required.

LIVESTOCK: Horses, cattle, sheep, goats, hogs, etc. Also poultry, chickens, ducks, turkeys and geese should be listed.

Space is also provided on the form for fur bearing animals, rabbits and bees.

All farm implements and machinery, all industrial equipment—sawmill, logging and mining equipment, etc.

Garage and service station equipment, pumps, tanks, oil storage containers, etc.

Motorized equipment not licensed with the state. Boats, vessels, and other watercraft, outboard motors.
