Future Projects Of Rod-Gun Club To Be Discussed

Future plans of the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club will be discussed in an all-membership meeting at 8 o'clock tomorrow night, in the Knights of Pythias hall. A letter from Bruce Yeager, secretary, to members of the organization this week urges active participation in club activities and lists almost two dozen "traps" currently "in the fire" and planned.

The club plans to build a club house and pavilion on its recently acquired property at Winchester, and to clear some of the land near the river bank for use as a picnic ground.

Also planned are an archery club, women's rifle and trap shoot teams, a horseshoe club, a fly casting club. These will be in addition to present activities, which include weekly trap shoots, high school rifle team, development of the site at Winchester, and work for the passage of conservation measures by the legislature.

Members are asked to indicate their preference in club activities on a questionnaire attached to the letter and to leave it at the Umpqua Valley Hardware or at Powell's Sporting Goods Store, or to bring it to the meeting.

The Roseburg Rod and Gun Club, affiliated with the Oregon Wild Life Federation, is second largest such group in Oregon.

Business Cannot Survive Present OPA, Assertion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Ralph E. Flanders, representing the committee for economic development, told Congress today price controls should be extended for another year but that business cannot live with OPA. "In its present form," he said, "it should be considered before the House Banking Committee, now considering a bill to prolong OPA's life for another year, he said that price control should be 'terminated finally and completely, except for rent controls, in the spring of 1947.'"

"I urge both the temporary extension and the definite termination of price control," he explained. "These are equally important—the temporary extension to avoid inflation, the prompt and definite termination to restore free markets."

"I do not think that business can live with price control in its present form for another year. We must modify it so that it can live and be lived with. It should be liberalized and streamlined to reduce delays, inequities and obstacles to production. He emphasized his own opinion that without continuation of price controls for the immediate months ahead, prices of many commodities would "skyrocket," and the economy would be damaged by inflation. But he said "price control at present is unworkable and unfair."

Waterfront Dispute in Portland Deadlocks

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—The waterfront dispute here between employers and the CIO supercarriers and checkers was deadlocked today and union officers said it probably will remain so until settlement is made in negotiations under way at San Francisco.

The 113 members voted last night to reject the employers' return-to-work terms, which would allow ship operators to set the number of checkers on each ship. The Waterfront Employers Association said this was provided in the contract.

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Ban on Peacetime Conscription is Strongly Urged

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Spokesmen for two educational groups joined Senator Capper today in urging legislation seeking an international ban on peacetime conscription.

They testified before the House military committee on behalf of a resolution by House Republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts to defer action on compulsory universal training pending efforts to outlaw it everywhere.

The Rev. Edward V. Stanford, rector of Augustine College, Washington, and spokesman for the National Catholic Educational Association, told the committee he was "not impressed" by those who believed the United Nations would not seek to outlaw conscription.

"The effort should be made," he said, "in no other way, I am convinced, can this nation in good conscience consider proposals for universal military training in peacetime."

The views of the National Education Association were presented by William G. Carr, based on policy expressions made formally by NEA protests last December.

"We do not favor a system of compulsory peacetime military training because we do not think that at the present time that is the best way to get security," Carr said.

If other measures fail, he added, compulsory training and service "could be adopted as a last resort."

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Years Required to Rebuild Germany; Food Prior Need

FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 28.—(AP)—It would be easy for the traveler in Germany to lose his perspective of the Reich's true position, because the terrific devastation wrought in cities across the whole face of the land by Allied bombing tends to obscure everything else.

Berlin, Essen, Cologne, Nuernberg, Munich, Frankfurt and scores of others—they're all the same—just ghostly, empty shells which once housed millions—ghosts of places which not long ago were among the world's great centers.

It's hard to believe that this unprecedented devastation isn't a mortal blow. You almost distrust your eyes when they tell you that thousands of people are scurrying about and making their homes among the ruins.

But this destruction isn't a mortal blow, although it may be called the knockout blow. It isn't even the paramount problem of rehabilitation, as I see the picture.

In the last war, when there were long periods of trench duty, millions of men lived in dugouts and did all right. More important than push chairs and bayonets is food. And that is the

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number one problem in Germany at the moment.

When reconstruction becomes possible, it will take many years to rebuild any of the destroyed cities. Experts estimate it will require as long as 30 years even to clear out the rubble in places like Berlin and Essen, to say nothing of rebuilding. Thus for a long time to come thousands upon thousands of city folk will be cave dwellers. Can the Germans take it?

Foreign Nations Facing Critical Food Situation

Although the shooting war is over, people in many countries are still fighting a desperate battle against starvation. The Department of Agriculture lists these three chief causes of the world food situation: Reduction in 1945 of total world food production by 12 per cent per capita

below pre-war, concentration of this reduction chiefly in countries normally dependent on imports, and disruption of distribution in war-torn nations.

The United States and Canada, the British Isles and the Middle East are the only large areas where food production in 1945 was relatively favorable. Food supplies in the U. S. continue at record levels with production about one-third above the pre-war average and per capita consumption exceeding that of any previous year.

Farmers did their part of the job in 1945 by producing large crops and are being urged to repeat that performance again in 1946. Now, all Americans are being asked to do two things: (1) Remember the seriousness of the world food situation when they are tempted to be impatient with temporary inconveniences; and (2) save food—don't waste it. Every pound of bread saved means almost a pound of wheat saved for people who will need it desperately in a few months.
