More Funds Asked For Experimental Ranges, Forests

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee yesterday approved a five-year program for establishing experimental ranges and forests. Expenditure of \$2,330,000 for forest and range management investigations was recommended in its report on the Agricultural Department appropriation bill.

Included was \$730,000 more for forest and range experimental work than was appropriated last year, and \$480,000 more than was recommended by the Bureau of Budget.

The appropriation would finance 53 experimental projects in 1947. By 1951, under the proposed expansion program, there would be 70.

Congressmen from nearly every western state approved this work. They said unless forest ranges are developed and reseeded, fewer and fewer livestock can be pastured on reserves. Representative Barrett (R., Wyo.) stated that forest grazing permits may be cut from 50 to 60 per cent in some cases because of range deterioration, the hearing records showed.

The livestock industry is "violently opposed" to such reductions, Barrett continued.

Vegetables for Canning to Have No Support Prices

There will be no grower support prices on vegetables for processing in 1946, and Oregon growers are advised by the State AAA committee to make their planting plans accordingly.

Instead of the support price program in effect during the war years, "designated grower area average prices" will give growers some indication of the prices they can expect and which processors can pay within the cost-in-price structure. These designated average prices, as announced by the USDA and OPA, will be used as the raw material cost basis in computing processors' maximum prices for the 1946 packs of canned and frozen vegetables.

The 1946 packs of snap beans, beets, carrots, cabbage for kraut and fresh shelled beans will be suspended from price control. Hence no average grower prices have been designated for those commodities.

Average Prices Set

For the other vegetables grown in Oregon, which will remain under price control in 1946, average growers prices have been set as follows: Asparagus, 1942 price plus \$40 a ton; fresh lima beans, other than Fordhook, \$120 a ton; sweet corn, \$23 a ton; mushrooms, 50 cents a pound; green peas for canning, \$79 a ton; green peas for freezing grown in western Oregon, \$98 a ton; spinach, \$50 a ton for above-ground cutting, \$35 for below-ground; tomatoes, \$26 a ton.

For other vegetables not listed but which will remain under price control in 1946, the grower average prices will be the 1942 price plus 20 per cent.

All prices are on a field run basis, and no breakdown by size, grade or variety will be made. Processors have been informed that for the vegetables subsidized in 1945, and which will remain under price control, the same gross maximum prices will be continued. This will be done either by continuing subsidy payments or by adjusting consumer maximum prices for the amount of the subsidy.

Political Purge Hits Jap Tycoons

TOKYO, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Japan's cabinet, applying General MacArthur's final political purge list, yesterday barred from public office the top officials of 32 industrial and banking corporations along with "tens of thousands" of other wartime leaders, large and small.

In this far-reaching blow against the wartime industrial hierarchy of Japan, the new cabinet ordinance also disqualified officials of at least 14 industrial control associations and other

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government-controlled organizations.

The ordinance, detailing regulations for the application of MacArthur's ultra-nationalist purge, closely paralleled the Allied directive. Cabinet officials estimated it would hit "tens of thousands" of wartime figures in public life.

Japanese sources asserted that many present leaders of unaffiliated government corporations will be eliminated from office for "ultra-nationalist records in the past."

Pauley Natural Target for Foes' Political Attack

Just for the moment, let's forget about Edwin W. Pauley's qualifications or lack of them to be Undersecretary of the Navy.

If we have a political sense of humor, we can still join the professional politicians in a chuckle about the raking over the coals the Republicans gave another administration appointee.

To contest every presidential appointment that is vulnerable is good politics. If the appointee has enemies in his own party—votes that might go against him to make up a majority—he hasn't a chance of even getting the Senate committee approval without a vigorous going over.

Pauley Shining Target "Ed" Pauley was a cinch for such a going over. He was former chief campaign fund raiser for the Democratic national committee. Starting from scratch as an underpaid college instructor, he had made a million or few in "the oil game." His feud with the "Old Curmudgeon," Interior Secretary Harold L. Ickes, was an open secret. Similar feuds with the State Department and the Department of Justice, or at least certain persons in them, were too widely rumored not to have some basis in fact. His only previous government appointment—that of reparations commissioner in Europe and Japan—had been attacked already as "a political payoff." His only previous Naval

experience had been winning the San Francisco-Honolulu yacht race (a good deal more than many secretaries, not to mention undersecretaries, of the Navy have had, it might be noted in passing).

Is it any wonder that, regardless of his merits or demerits, the opposition considered him a golden opportunity?

It isn't often that the opposition is able to defeat one of the President's appointments. The President confers with his leaders

in the Senate before he makes them. But such rakings over do lay the basis for later criticisms and "I-told-you-so's." That's good politics.
