Senator Ball of Minnesota, also of B2 H2, says he agrees "100% with Vandenberg's position on Russia. Senator Fullbright of Arkansas adds: "Vandenberg is absolutely correct in the essence of his statements."

(Hatch and Fullbright are Democrats. Ball is a Republican. All three are regarded as holding INTELLIGENTLY liberal views on our foreign relations.

WE shall certainly be unwise if we split in Russia's face. We shall be equally unwise if we fail to look at Russia with realistic eyes.

There is bad strike trouble at Philadelphia, where 1,000 mounted police break up a mass picketing attempt that had been forbidden by court order.

It is essential that we understand what mass picketing is. It is an attempt to get what you want BY PHYSICAL FORCE. We can't permit that and continue as a democracy.

RALPH FLANDERS, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston and a member of the Committee for Economic Development, tells Congress: "Price controls should be extended for another year, but business can't live with OPA in ITS PRESENT FORM for another year."

(Because, he means, OPA in its present form is STRANGLING initiative and incentive to produce, and the American system can't exist and function if initiative and incentive to produce are strangled.)

What we are dimly struggling toward is the goal of smaller UNIT profits with higher income for the masses, so that ABILITY TO BUY the products of assembly-line industry won't bog down and cause depressions and shut-downs. hat can't be accomplished in one stroke by executive order. It will have to come slowly by the process of trial and error.

SUPPORT THE RED CROSS

Throughout the month of March appeals will be made for financial support for the American Red Cross. Organization for membership solicitation in Douglas County has been completed, and canvassing for funds already is in progress.

Any attempt to "sell" the American Red Cross to the general public would be futile. Its humanitarian accomplishments are well known to everyone. Millions of voluntary apostles will preach backing for the Red Cross, as returned servicemen and former prisoners of war recount miracles of relief, comfort, and service throughout war years.

Many ex-prisoners of war freely admit they owe their lives to timely arrival of Red Cross packages of food and medicine. Mental suffering of many service men was relieved by Red Cross service as an intermediary between him and distressed or bereaved relatives. The Red Cross canteen was one of the important factors in maintaining morale. In every phase of military life, the Red Cross was at hand to aid.

But Red Cross service did not end with the war. It is organized for peace as well as for war. Trained and equipped for emergencies, it is ready at any moment to render efficient relief measures in connection with disaster. With millions of untrained men being employed in industrial plants, its schools in first aid will result in life saving in peace as in war. The program of water safety undoubtedly will be greatly extended.

The Red Cross, however, will perform its greatest service in postwar rehabilitation and relief for ex-service men. Throughout the nation its chapters will be organized to carry comfort to hospitalized veterans, to aid in tasks of rehabilitating the disabled, assisting in handling claims for government benefits, lending a sympathetic ear to personal problems and assisting in solutions, even providing financial aid when circumstances merit.

The American Red Cross will not slacken its endeavors to serve humanity simply because war has ceased. The peacetime domestic front offers continuous battle for soldiers who serve under the banner of the Red Cross.

There is no lack of gratitude on the part of the American public for the deeds of the Red Cross. There may, however, be a lack of understanding of its financial needs in days that lie ahead. Many may believe that, because war is over, the Red Cross will not need as much financial backing as in days just past.

But the task of binding up the wounds of war will prove costly. To continue its widespread humanitarian service requires that the Red Cross be adequately financed. It must depend entirely upon our generosity, for it has no source of income other than our benevolence. Certainly its record justifies our fullest measure of encouragement. There should be no hesitancy in our answer to the annual appeal for funds.

Douglas County folk have a long-standing record for consistent support to the Red Cross. We are confident there will be continued cooperation in the campaign to be conducted on a county-wide scale during the current month.

CHICAGO, March 2.—(AP)—Arturo Godoy, the South American heavyweight, and Lee Savold of Patterson, N. J., will have to wait until next week to learn whether they'll get paid for appearing in the Chicago Stadium ring last night.

Godoy was to receive 30 per cent of the net receipts and Savold 25 per cent, but their purses were held up by the Illinois Athletic Commission when Referee Johnny Behr declared the bout "no contest" in the eighth round. Their purses were ordered held up pending a meeting of the Illinois Athletic Commission.

The bout was a succession of clinches, with few punches thrown, as the two apparently awaited each other's attack, to the disappointment of 7,905 fans who paid a gross of \$32,046 to see the Stadium program.

School Officials Meet March 9 to Discuss Budget

School officials from all Douglas County districts are to convene in the Courthouse in Roseburg March 9, to discuss the budget for the coming year, Mrs. Lulu C. Gorrell, county school superintendent announced today.

The meeting will be held in the circuit court room from 9:30 A. M. until afternoon. Besides the budget, other matters for discussion will include legislation proposed for the November ballot, information on teacher supply and salary trends, and the keeping of records and reports by school board clerks.

School board officials who have problems which need discussion, such as buildings, finances, transportation, truancy, selection of teachers, consolidations, and veterans' education, are asked to make note of them in advance. "Some problems may require expert advice," Mrs. Gorrell said. Budget forms for school districts will be distributed at the meeting.
