Anti-Toxin Serum Flown To Botulism Victims

PRINEVILLE, Ore., March 5.—(AP)—A State Health Dept. official today was investigating the apparent food poisoning of three persons for whom special botulism anti-toxin serum was rushed by Army airmen from Portland. The investigation, by Dr. Will Aufrane, was ordered by State Health Officer Dr. Harold Erickson after a local physician reported Herman Gillen, 25, was suffering throat paralysis and his wife and brother showing symptoms of botulism infection. Dr. Raymond Atkinson said the three became ill Friday after eating a cold vegetable salad. The serum was flown here yesterday.

Churchill Warns of Peril of Communism

Would Extend Defense Pact

Churchill, leader of the Atlee government's loyal opposition asserted that the United States already has a permanent defense agreement with Canada and added that "this principle" should be "extended to all the British Commonwealths with full reciprocity."

He advocated "continuance of the intimate relationships between our military advisers, leading to common study of potential dangers, similarity of weapons, and manuals of instruction, and interchange of officers and cadets at college" and "joint use of all naval and air bases in the possession of either country all over the world."

Eventually, the eloquent Britisher continued, "there may come the principle of common citizenship, but that we may be content to leave to destiny, whose outstretched arm so many of us can clearly see."

Keep Atomic Bomb Secret

Turning to the atomic bomb, Churchill said that in view of the uncertain world situation, it would be "wrong and imprudent" for the United States, Britain and Canada to confide the secret to the N.U.C. while that agency "is still in its infancy."

"No one in any country," he observed, "has slept less well in their beds because this knowledge and the method and the raw materials to apply are at present largely retained in American hands."

"I do not believe we should have kept so soundly had the positions been reversed and some Communist or neo-Fascist state monopolized, for the time being, these dread agencies. The fear of them alone might easily have been used to enforce totalitarian systems upon the free democratic world, with consequences appalling to the human imagination."

Personally Admires Stalin

The Britisher, he said, have a 20-year treaty of collaboration and mutual assistance with Russia and "I agree with Mr. Bevin that it might well be a fifty years treaty." Bevin recently proposed extending the treaty.

Churchill spoke of his "strong admiration and regard for the valiant Russian people and for my war-time comrade, Marshal Stalin."

While he said he understood Russia's need to be secure on her western frontiers from all renewal of German aggression and welcomed her "to her rightful place among the leading nations in the world," he added:

Influence Sphere Cited

"Warsaw, Berlin, Prague, Vienna, Budapest, Belgrade, Bucharest and Sofia, all those famous cities and populations around them lie in the Soviet sphere and all are subject in one form or another, not only to Soviet influence but to a very high and increasing measure of control from Moscow."

"Athens alone, with its immortal glories, is free to decide its future at an election under British, American and French observation. The Russian-dominated Polish government has been encouraged to make enormous and wrongful inroads upon Germany, and mass expulsions of millions of Germans on a scale

previous and undreamed-of are now taking place."

Churchill, saying Turkey and Persia are "profoundly alarmed" by claims made upon them by Moscow and that the Russians in Berlin are attempting to build up a "quasi-Communist party" in Germany, asserted "this is certainly not the liberated Europe we fought to build up."

Russian communistic influence, he continued, is at work in Italy and France. And the outlook, he added, "is also anxious in the Far East and especially in Manchuria."

Social Security Credit To War Veterans Asked

WASHINGTON, March 5.—(AP)—The American Legion urged Congress yesterday to grant a social security monthly wage credit of \$160 to an estimated 17,000,000 veterans of World War I for the period of their military service.

The Legion proposal was presented by John Thomas Taylor, Legion legislative director, to the House ways and means committee as it resumed hearings on proposed broadening of the social security program.

Taylor recommended that the government make retroactive contributions for employers and employees on behalf of veterans, and estimated the cost at \$73 per veteran.

Taylor said the plan would protect those who left employment
