single-family dwellings, except that in certain cases the insured mortgage could reach \$7,200. Mortgages would be insured up to 90 per cent of the appraised value of a home.

The increased insurance authority was asked by the administration as a part of the veterans housing program.

During debate on the program Rep. Barry (D-N. Y.) read a letter from Housing Expediter Wilson Wyatt saying he intended to retain a \$10,000 price ceiling for newly constructed homes but that it was planned to channel the bulk of scarce materials into homes costing around \$6,000.

House Republicans were in complete charge, being given control by a bloc of Southern Democrats, and planned to offer a complete substitute for the much-battered Administration Bill.

**Funds For VA Voted**

The House yesterday also approved a new \$114,000,000 administrative fund for the Veterans Administration.

With but brief debate, it passed and sent to the Senate a deficiencies supply bill carrying that amount for VA and \$14,550,000 for several other agencies, including the Social Security Board, the Agriculture Department and the Postoffice Department.

awakening in the life of the individual and in the councils of the world.

"There is no problem on this earth tough enough to withstand the flame of a genuine renewal of religious faith," the President said. "And some of the problems of today will yield to nothing less than that kind of revival.

"If the world is long to survive, the gigantic power which man has acquired through atomic energy, must be matched by spiritual strength of greater magnitude."

## Food Sharing Urged

Mr. Truman included in his address an appeal for food sharing "to save the starving millions in Europe and Asia and Africa."

He said America's churches—Protestant and Catholic and the Jewish synagogues—bound together in the American "unity of brotherhood" must provide the "shock forces" to accomplish the "spiritual awakening" necessary to substitute "decency and reason

## Planing Plants, Crews Deadlocked On Wage Parley

PORTLAND, Ore., March 1.—(AP)—Oregon's AFL Planer Millmen reported to a union meeting instead of to work this morning after wage boost negotiations ended in a deadlock.

The large Nicolai-Neppach Company planing mill here was idle, along with other mills making specialized wood products and small two and three man establishments around the state. Some 1,200 workers—800 or 900 of them in Portland—are involved in the dispute.

The union seeks a 20 cent hourly increase. James M. Scudder, attorney for the Woodwork Employers Association, said the association offered 10 cents, with the other 10 cents if price ceilings were raised.

Herman Schmunk, union business agent, said some employers not members of the association—offered 17 cents, and that workers in those plants would return to the job after the union mass meeting.

The 17 cent offer included an agreement to meet later any wage boosts granted by the association. About 700 of the AFL workers are in plants covered by the association.

The President said that "every possible resource of government would be used to reach our goal of 2,700,000 low-cost homes within the next two years," and added:

"The spiritual welfare of our people of tomorrow is going to depend on the kind of home life which our nation has today.

"That is why it is important that all churches throughout America cooperate in the national share-the-home effort. If each congregation of the 250,000 churches and synagogues in this country would open their spare rooms to only four veterans, one million veterans and their families could receive temporary shelter until new houses are available."

Asserting home life must conform to "an ever-rising standard," Mr. Truman declared:

"To raise that standard should be, and is, the constant aim of your government and the underlying basis of its policies. It would make the effort so much easier if people and nations would apply some of the principles of social justice and ethical standards which have come down to us from Biblical times. He said that questions which beset the country "in strikes and wages and working conditions" would be simpler "if men and women were willing to apply the principles of the Golden Rule."

The President called upon all Americans to prove their faith by doing their share "to save starving millions in Europe, and Asia and Africa."

"Share your food by eating less," he said, "and prevent millions from dying of starvation. Reduce your abundance so that others may have a crust of bread. In short, prove yourselves worthy of the liberty and dignity which you have preserved on this earth, by helping those less fortunate who have been starved by the dictators for so many long years and who still starve even in liberation."
