B. P. W. C. MEETING HELD MONDAY NIGHT

The Business and Professional Women's Club held their regular business meeting Monday evening in the Labor Council room in the Pacific building. In keeping with the National Federation's plan the theme for the program was "What Is Our Town Doing About Counseling?" Miriam Allen gave a talk on what was being done and the work in progress in developing counseling in the Roseburg schools and some of the work being done throughout the county and state. Many men and women with experience in personnel work and a potential for that type of contact work are being trained in large numbers to take charge of this type of counseling. Because of the versatility in the scope of knowledge demanded for efficiently carrying out this work the preparation must be detailed and varied in order that every type of problem may be successfully diagnosed. This work is not a separate unit working independently but will cooperate and assist the home, the regular teachers, parents, church and welfare workers as well as other clubs carrying out this policy. It was pointed out that even though this type of counseling has always been needed and wanted there is an even greater need for it just now in the reorganization of the post-war world. These counselors will help the younger people direct their education and activities to best prepare for their futures in consideration of their personalities, needs and circumstances.

A committee was appointed to represent the club to assist more efficiently in contacting return-

ing service women, and helping them to adjust themselves to their new life. This committee will work with the city council in making contacts with the returning men. Appointed were Clara Berg, Dolma Grobe and Cornelia McCallister. The chairman of that committee, Mrs. Berg, was appointed to work with the Red Cross board in that same line of activity.

Considerable progress has been made and much enthusiasm shown in the gathering and packing of the individual boxes being sent to the addresses in war-torn Europe. The cooperation shown by business firms in assisting in the donation of clothing and foodstuffs is certainly appreciated.

Dolma Grobe reported on the proceeds to be sent to the Chinese fund for training of Chinese nurses. Everyone knows the need for this activity, but one stops to think of the inadequacy of the training and equipment, one can realize that it is nothing short of a miracle that the Chinese hospitals accomplish what they do. To show the ingenuity of Chinese nurses working under the handicaps of little material, instead of having the bent glass tubes used to feed patients liquids without lifting their heads, these Chinese nurses use hollow penholders with three or four inches of rubber tubing inserted where the pen point would ordinarily go. The rubber furnishes the needed flexibility and the penholders can be easily sterilized and used again. Enamelware is so scarce in free China that often there would be only two bedpans in a thousand-bed military hospital. An accurate timepiece is indispensable to a nurse. Since watches are im-

ported, a Chinese nurse could not afford to buy one. They use one minute sand-glasses when they have to take a patient's pulse or respiration.

A group of high school students graciously presented, in good form, a melodrama entitled "The Charleston Tragedy," which was very much appreciated and enjoyed by the group.

Ina Farnsworth and Verna Carothers were appointed joint chairmen to make arrangements for the Southern District Conference which the club will entertain in April.
