## Spain Asserts She Aided Allies, Not Axis, in War No. 2

LONDON, March 7. — (AP) — Spain, fighting back against the movement abroad for replacement of the Franco regime, maintained today that her government aided the Allied powers during the war by preventing axis domination of the Mediterranean, North Africa and the Near East.

"Hitler planned to enter Spain Jan. 10, 1941. We saw the intention of the two dictators to incorporate Spain into the Axis and so to dominate the Mediterranean, and with it North Africa and the Near East," the Madrid radio said.

"The one who prevented the carrying out of these ambitious plans was neither Great Britain nor the United States of America. The one who prevented it was General Francisco Franco," the broadcast declared.

"Spain did not want to enter and did not enter the war, in spite of all the coercion of the Axis powers, with their troops on our frontiers, ready to break in and march down on Gibraltar."

The broadcast, citing letters between Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, denied that Spain offered to enter the war on the Axis side, as the U. S. State Department has charged. Allied leaders, including Winston Churchill, were quoted as acknowledging that "the attitude of Spain contributed not a small part to the frustration of the plans of the Axis."

**Breaks Demanded**  
 The Spanish government in exile continued to urge in Paris that the Allied powers sever all relations—diplomatic and commercial—with Spain, saying that such action was the only means of forcing Franco from power.

In Oslo, Foreign Minister Lange told parliament that the Norwegian government was as anxious "as the Norwegian people" to break with Franco Spain.

In Bogota, a meeting called to urge the Colombian government to break off relations with Spain was followed by a two-hour battle in which an undetermined number of persons were injured as an anti-communist group besieged the theater in which the meeting was held.

## Reds Trying to Divide Religions, Solon Charges

WASHINGTON, March 7. — (AP) — Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.) declared yesterday Russia "is going out of its way openly to attack religion in an effort to divide the religions of the western world."

The House majority leader in a statement demanded "firmness" in dealings of the United States with the Soviet Union and added:

"Outside of the Soviet Union all the nations of the world have shown a strong desire to work

for peace. It is up to Soviet Russia to cooperate or to be charged with responsibility for failure."

McCormack declared that "one thing seems certain—the United States cannot and should not, for its own best interests, as well as for future peace, continue what appears to be a policy of appeasement of Soviet Russia and its imposition of communistic control upon other countries of the world."

## Better Breed of Meat Chicken to Bring Cash Prize

Oregon poultry breeders, old or young, may participate this year in the early phases of a three-year national contest to develop the "chickens of tomorrow," announced Noel Bennion, extension poultryman at O. S. C., who is a member of the national contest committee. The object is to develop a better breed, strain or cross that will produce better meat for the consumer at greater profit for the producer.

The Oregon Baby Chick Association is sponsoring the contest this year which will culminate in a dressed poultry show in connection with the annual meeting at Oregon State College late in June. No cash prizes will be given the first two years, but \$8000 is available for the final competition.

**Procedure Stated**  
 Each participant this year may enter from 50 to 300 chicks hatched between March 17 and 27, Bennion explains. These are to be identified at hatching time by leg bands or other acceptable mark. Records will be kept as to number started, mortality, and feed used.

These chickens are to be raised on the contestant's own farm to a uniform age to be announced later. They will be inspected during the growing season. At the age specified, 12 cockerels will be selected by the owner to be dressed and exhibited in the June show. Certificates of quality will be awarded to winners.

For the final third-year national contest, breeders will send eggs to a central hatchery where they will be hatched and raised under identical conditions. A \$5000 award will go to the breeder whose birds score the most points considering all factors.

The Oregon committee handling this year's contest consists of F. E. Fox and Don Waterbury, both of Corvallis, and Dr. C. E. Holmes and Bennion of O. S. C. Full contest rules and details may be had from Bennion.

## Six Bad Guesses Of Hitler Helped Turn Tide of War

NUERNBERG, Germany, March 7. — (AP) — Top secret reports taken from files of German ministries now in Allied hands disclose that Adolf Hitler made six guesses in one month—November, 1942—that helped to turn the tide of war in favor of Great Britain and the United States.

Confronted with the fact that Gen. Eisenhower's forces had landed in Algeria and Morocco Nov. 8, 1942, Hitler's vaunted intuition failed him. A record of his faulty guesses follows.

1. He frantically alerted the German garrison in Norway—two seas and a continent away from Africa—to expect an imminent allied attack, ordered a Jaeger division to Narvik and additional reserves to Oslo and confessed that "Sweden's attitude in case of a landing would be very unreliable."

2. At the same time, the former corporal, functioning as supreme commander of the German army, envisaged an immediate allied strike toward the Romanis oil fields. He ordered more German troops sent to Crete and the Peloponnese and additional air force squadrons assigned there. This was at the time that Field Marshal Rommel was fleeing from El Alamein and needed reserves much worse than any Nazi commander on Crete.

3. Disregarding his highest naval advisers, Hitler refused to negotiate with the Vichy French fleet at Toulon for future collaboration on a new basis of equality. Although Grand Adm. Raeder painstakingly had sought to arrange for French warships and French crews to join in the Axis war and had obtained tentative agreement and joint acceptance from the Italian admiralty, Hitler threw this deal overboard.

4. Hitler dallied with a plan he had prepared two years earlier, the occupation of Spain and the closing of the western Mediterranean at Gibraltar. He informed the German army the time was ripe for action, but first he would have to negotiate with Franco. Then he did nothing more.

5. Seeing the specter of invasion virtually everywhere, he looked along the coastline of German-occupied Europe and decided to dismantle guns from idle German warships and convert them to shore batteries. He counted this defense factor as of greater value than the offensive power of these ships if sent out as raiders.

6. He upset the nerves of his submarine builders by commanding them to disassemble their boats so as not only to construct urgently needed replacements for Grand Adm. Doenitz's wolf packs, but to experiment with "U-boat transports." He explained he was considering the advisability of taking Iceland away from the Americans for a German air base.

## Cultivation Easy If Done Prior to Growth of Weeds

Soil cultivation takes but a few minutes per week, yet pays off with real dividends. One of the most important objectives obtained through constant cultivation is a minimum amount of weeds. There are almost always large amounts of weed seed lying dormant in the soil. When plants are set out or if the soil is disturbed in any way these weed seeds start to sprout. It's much easier to eradicate them while they're still young. There are certain weeds which develop an extremely strong tap root that may penetrate through the soil for several feet. Such a plant will rob your ornamentals of the moisture and food essentials to their well-

being. In other words, the weeds will prosper, the valued plants will die out.

**Go Down Deep**  
 Shallow cultivation is sufficient to eradicate all weeds in the younger stages. It's only when the weeds become established that deep cultivation will be required. You should start cultivating for the purpose of hacking out weeds just as soon as it is possible to distinguish between the weeds and your other plants. Cultivating also forms a dust mulch on the surface of the soil which conserves moisture, and prevents the ground from becoming baked in the hot sun. Hand cultivators may be used quite effectively for most garden purposes. The modern cultivators are streamlined and balanced so there is very little strain in using them even or several hours at a time. However, such a prolonged session is not necessary if you get after the weeds by cultivating the soil from week to week.

## Americans Arrest German Red Chiefs

BERLIN, March 7. — (AP) — The American military government has arrested 12 German Communist leaders in Schoenberg Borough, in the United States sector of Berlin, and charged them with intimidating German civil officials in promoting a proposed merger of Communist and Social Democratic parties.

Maj. Gen. Ray W. Barker, American commander in Berlin, said the arrested politicians would be tried in military courts on charges of "interfering with the business of the civil government and attempting to intimidate civil officials."

MOSCOW, March 7. — (AP) — The Army newspaper Red Star endorsed the Japanese Communist party today and said it was leading the struggle for democracy in Japan.

"The Communist party in Japan is leading a fierce struggle for creation of a united democratic front in Japan," the paper said.

## War Decorations Given Lt. Col. Eugene E. Laird

FORT LEWIS, March 7. — (AP) — Lt. Col. Eugene E. Laird of Salem, Ore., was presented the Silver Star and Purple Heart, won during fighting on Bataan, by Col. M. G. Keeler, commanding officer at Madigan hospital center, the hospital announced today.

Col. Laird was captured at the fall of Bataan and is recovering at the hospital from wounds received from brutal treatment by his captors. His wife, Irene, lives at 280 Sunset Ave., Salem, and his father is J. L. Laird of Myrtle Point, Ore.

The colonel is a graduate of the University of Oregon School of Law and plans to return to his former position as Public Utilities Commissioner at Salem.
