of the municipal airport to construct a pavilion and race track was announced today by the Washington County Fair Board.

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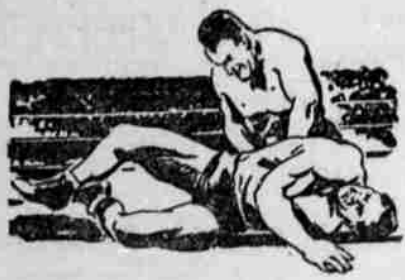

Bears Favored To Down Idaho Quint

BERKELEY, Calif., March 8.—(AP)—The California Bears, piloted in their quick breaking attack by the league leader, Andy Wolfe, take the floor at men's gymnasium tonight favorites to beat scrappy little Idaho in the start of the Pacific coast conference basketball playoffs.

The Vanders last won the title in 1925 when they defeated the Bears at Moscow.

Besides the conference crown, the series outcome will determine the Pacific coast representative for the Kansas City N. C. A. A. regional playoffs and a possible New York trip for the champions.

Idaho plays a slow breaking ball-control game, while California goes in for fast play.

The teams are evenly matched in height in every position but center. Here Idaho's freshman star, Jack Phoenix, 6 feet 9 inches, tops California's pivot man, Jim Smith, by four inches.

Louis Starts Training For Battle With Conn

WEST BADEN, Ind., March 8.—(AP)—A four-year period away from strenuous training for ring warfare ended today for Joe Louis.

The world's heavyweight boxing champion launched a 49-day tuning up program at this village spa in the first phase of his conditioning in preparation for the defense of his title against Challenger Billy Conn in New York's Yankee Stadium June 19.

Louis, who will be 32 years old on May 13, weighs 220 pounds, 13 above his fighting weight.

Russia's Answer to U. S. Request Awaited

relations improve or continue to worsen. There was no indication when it would arrive from Moscow.

It was believed likely that the State Department would make public a second note to Russia today. It concerns reported Soviet withdrawals of industrial equipment from Manchuria and proposals for Soviet-Chinese operation of Manchurian industries.

Declaring that the United States "cannot remain indifferent" to Russia's decision to keep troops in Iran, the note released last night said the Soviet action was contrary to:

The Roosevelt-Stalin-Churchill declaration in Tehran December 1, 1943, in which the three governments pledged "maintenance of the independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity of Iran."

The British-Russian-Iranian treaty of January 29, 1942, which pledged withdrawal of all foreign troops from Iran by six months after the end of the war—March 2.

Principles of the United Nations.

The note expressed the "earnest hope" that Russia would "do its part, by withdrawing immediately all Soviet forces from the territory of Iran, to promote the international confidence which is so necessary for peaceful progress among the people of all nations."

It requested that it be "promptly advised" of the Soviet decision.

Favorable Signs Seen

Meanwhile, optimists pointed out two developments yesterday and expressed the hope that they were straws in the wind. These were:

1. Russia's belated decision to send a delegation to the International Monetary Conference, which opens today on Wilming-

ton Island, near Savannah, Ga.

2. The announcement that the United States, Russia and Britain had agreed on a plan for dividing up Germany's remaining merchant ships, while permitting the Reich to keep 200,000 gross tons of shipping—about one-seventh of the total.

Ships totaling 1,189,000 gross tons and valued at \$80,000,000 are being divided equally among the three countries.

Truman Halts Move to Have Pauley Withdraw

showdown vote in the Senate. The other said he felt it meant only a delay until the middle of next week in withdrawal action.

When asked about the nomination at his news conference today, President Truman reminded reporters that he had made four statements already to news conferences on that subject.

The President told his last news conference that he was backing Pauley all the way.

Ikkes Contradicted

Senators in a position to know had said earlier that Pauley agreed yesterday to ask Mr. Truman to withdraw the nomination providing the naval committee made a statement praising his action and upholding his integrity.

In his statement to the committee today, Pauley asserted flatly that at no time had he ever suggested to Ikkes that California oil men would contribute to the Democrats if Ikkes would "lay off" the tidelands oil suit.

This was in direct contradiction to the testimony of Ikkes, former Secretary of Interior, that Pauley had told him in 1944 that \$300,000 could be raised from oil men if a government suit to obtain title to tidelands oil areas was not pressed.

Pauley asserted his determination is "stronger than ever" to carry on the fight for confirmation.

"For five weeks I have taken the most vicious punching a man can receive," the former Democratic National Committee treasurer declared. "For five weeks these hearings have been a public forum for anyone who wanted to slug me."

"You have heard it all and now you'll hear Ed Pauley," he said. "No man quits under fire—no honest man withdraws when he knows he's right."

Asserting that the basic issue is whether I have the proper qualifications to make a good and efficient Undersecretary of the Navy," Pauley said:

"I am convinced I can serve my country well and efficiently. I know I have served her loyally, honestly and faithfully in the past."

Ikkes, who resigned in a huff from the cabinet in an outgrowth of the controversy over the Pauley nomination, had testified Pauley offered "the rawest proposition ever made to me" during a conversation Sept. 6, 1944, in Ikkes' office. This, Ikkes said, was the suggestion that Pauley could obtain Democratic contributions from the oil men providing the tidelands suit was dropped.

Pauley said in his statement today Ikkes was "mistaken" if he thought Pauley—then Democratic treasurer—was soliciting any contingent contributions.

The \$300,000 figure, the witness said, was the quota which had been set for the District of Columbia and he contended he was discussing with Ikkes.

As a matter of fact, Pauley said that California oil men actually had contributed only \$13,400 to Roosevelt's fourth term campaign.

Senator Lew Wallace Files for Congress Job

SALEM, Ore., March 8.—(AP)—State Sen. Lew Wallace, Portland, Democratic national committeeman, unexpectedly filed his candidacy today for congress in the Third District, which consists of Multnomah County.

He will oppose Charles T. McPherson, Portland, for the nomination. The seat is held by Rep. Homer D. Angell, Portland, who is so far unsupported for the Republican nomination.

Mat Villain Here Saturday

The Pacific coast light-heavyweight championship will be at stake at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night when Paavo Katon and Pierre LaBelle clash—but considerable interest is being shown also in the semi-final skirmish between Al Szasz and Bruno Angelo.

There will be nothing lacking in the way of fireworks and color in the title tilt, but Douglas county grappling railbirds are certain of seeing a knock-down and drag-out affair in the preliminary between the young Hungarian matman and the Italian ruffian.

Angelo has been cutting a fancy figure since his debut in the northwest about a month ago and he has been pointing toward a junior heavyweight title tilt match. His rough-and-tumble tactics will find a willing opponent in Szasz, who has proven his ability to give and take with the toughest.

Angelo will be making his local debut and he comes here with a great reputation. For years before his initial invasion of the Pacific northwest, the Italian matman was a headliner throughout the mid-west. His meanie tactics are not always noticeable to the casual spectators—like an experienced basketball backboard man uses his elbows to advantage. In some mat circles he is extremely popular despite his aggressiveness.

Youth vs. Experience

Holding the spotlight, however, will be the championship clash in which LaBelle will be given better than an outside chance to topple Katon. Pierre will be matching youth, speed and agility against Katon's superior strength and long years of mat experience.

The Saturday night show is certain to attract a capacity crowd. The title tilt is a match that every wrestling community in the state was angling for and Douglas county followers are certain to be disappointed.

Former LaGrande Doctor Kills Self With Scalpel

YREKA, Calif., March 8.—(AP)—A man registered as Dr. Ernest C. Miller of LaGrande, Ore., was found dead in a motor court shower room yesterday, his throat slashed and a blood covered scalpel at his side. A hypodermic needle lay nearby.

Deputy Sheriff Brick Hammack said it was evident the man had ended his own life, and that he probably first administered a local anesthetic to his throat.

In the cottage was a box, apparently containing the man's effects. It bore a note stating the box was to be opened only by his wife, named as Mrs. Constance E. Miller of San Francisco.

Information received from LaGrande, Ore., was to the effect that a Dr. Miller came there last year but remained only a few months. He had been in military service before going to LaGrande.

Both your dealer and we were encouraged by this production picture at the turn of the year. But the strike changed all that. As you know, the CIO United Farm Equipment & Metal Workers of America called a strike in ten of our plants, on January 21, 1946.

What Is The Strike About?

Wages are a basic issue. At the time of the strike, Harvester employees were among the highest paid workers in American industry. When the strike began, the average hourly

earnings in the ten plants, not including overtime, were \$1.15½. If present wage proposals are adopted, this figure will become \$1.33½ per hour.

When the strike began, negotiations were broken off by the Union on the issue of compulsory union membership. The Company has no desire to weaken the Union. It recognizes certain reasonable needs of the Union. But the Company does oppose compulsory unionism. It feels strongly that an employee's membership should be a matter of his own choice.

Material Costs and Price Relief

Wages and materials are the great costs of operating our business—together they consume all but a few cents of every dollar the Company takes in. Wages are obviously going to be high—and nobody knows just how high material costs will go.

In the face of rising costs of materials, the Company does not see how it can pay the wage increases recommended by a Government fact finding board until it has definite and satisfactory assurance from the Government that reasonable price relief will be granted to the Company within a reasonable period of time. This matter is of such importance that it will not be discussed here, but will be covered by future advertisements devoted to both prices and profits.
