Boy Scout Gains, Civic Activities Shown in Report

With more than three dozen new communities adopting the program of Scouting within the last two years, a challenge of "Quality" must be met in the coming year, according to a statement by Roger L. Bales, Scout executive of the Oregon Trail council, Boy Scouts of America, in the council's twenty-first annual report.

The Boy Scout council has the job of helping the sponsoring institutions to make a success of their troops or packs in Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane, and Lincoln counties.

Membership in the six-county council now totals 3822, as compared to 1730 at the end of 1942. There are now 1137 Cub Scouts, 1755 Boy Scouts, and 39 Senior Scouts, with 891 adults registered in the Boy Scout movement.

There are 114 packs, troops, and senior units in the council, according to the 1945 report, and the 1942 total. A net gain of 48 units was made during 1945. Use of Camp Lucky Boy, council summer camp, by troops from all parts of the council showed an increase with 524 different Scouts attending the camp with their troops in 1945 compared to 161 in 1942 and 425 in 1944.

Among civic service and war service activities in which troops and packs participated were waste paper campaigns, war loan drives, tuberculosis association campaign, war fund campaigns, ushuring, troop and pack "good turns" book collection, united national clothing collection, distribution of government information material, "food for freedom" program, and a traffic safety drive.

Steady advancement was maintained by troop and packs in the council with Boy Scouts receiving 1746 merit badges for meeting requirements in vocational and recreational subjects. Most popular merit badges were personal health, pathfinding, public health, safety and first aid.

Four sections of the council annual meetings were held recently in Eugene, Corvallis, Coquille and Roseburg. Officers of the council and members of the council executive board were elected at these meetings. Those elected are: J. R. Bruckart, William Forest Service supervisor, president; B. C. Elliott, of Roseburg, vice president; Bruce Tuck, chairman of the Douglas district committee, of Roseburg; and W. H. Gerretsen of Roseburg.

Scouting units in Roseburg now include Troop 4, sponsored by the First Methodist Church, with John J. Howard as scoutmaster; Troop 7, sponsored by the American Legion, with J. E. Henbest as scoutmaster; and Pack 304.

sponsored by the First Methodist Church, with Earl Kelly as cubmaster.

Other scouting units in Douglas County are located at Glendale, Sutherlin, Camas Valley, Myrtle Creek, Melrose, Glide and Drain.

Cutting Feed Costs

The burning question facing the egg producer these days is "to sell, or not to sell." If we don't sell, we simply must cut the cost of production. Feed is the biggest item in cost of production, so any reduction in the feed cost means added profit or labor return.

We'll be frank. There will be no noticeable change in the cost of a sack of feed for many weeks yet. So your best bet is to get more out of that 100 lbs. of feed than you ever did before. Here are a few ways that will help you.

An "all pullet" flock: You can raise pullets to productive age on about 28 lbs. of feed, and at a total cost of about a dollar to \$1.25 cash. On the average for the last year, a hen has brought \$1.50 to \$1.75 on the market, that represents a profit of a half a buck on the hen. In addition, the pullet will lay around fourteen months while the hen, if carried through a molt will have only about nine months left to lay. With hatching eggs and chick cheap, you can't afford to carry old hens through a green feed.

Green Feed: In the production of meat, poultry and by-products, very few growers realize the economy effected by green feed. In fact, "you couldn't make a living with a dairy without pasture. Plenty of green feed will cut cost of producing turkey meat 25% or more, according to official experiments. The same is true of raising your pullets up to laying age. We know of no exact data on the value of green feed in egg production, but it is most certain" high. By all means, have all the greens you can.

Healthy Birds: One of the important costs of egg production, (or meat production) is mortality. Reducing mortality will increase the results from every sack of feed. Buying disease-free chicks, and keeping them that way with reasonable sanitation and good feed is so smart, we can't see why we should have to even mention it. But, you'd be surprised what we see.

Good Breeding: A well bred, high producing animal or bird will eat VERY LITTLE MORE than a scrub but will make much more use of what it eats. Which means you can't afford to feed high priced stuff to low quality consumers. It takes approximately 65 lbs. of feed to maintain the average hen a year. The right kind of hen, properly raised and fed, will eat 40 lbs. more feed, and produce 240 eggs.

Umpqua Feed: Starting with good breeding, good management, good sanitation, the only other requirement is "good feed. When you can buy good feed, made right at home by your own neighbors and friends, of quality equal to any feed made any place, and still get it for 25c to 50c a sack less, your choice of feed is limited to only one: UMPQUA. A lot of brooder stoves will begin belching out briquette and wood smoke right away. We always have lots of trouble with the stove pipes gumming up on a sort of tar, or crowsote. We understand that the use of "Red Devil," or "Chimney Sweep" according to directions will prevent this. It will

also greatly reduce the danger of fire. Use it.

Good News

It seems the fair haired boys down in Washington have decided there are as many white folks as Indians out in the Wild and Woolly West. At any rate, they have changed the "wheat order." We can now use 85% as much wheat as we used of all grain in the corresponding month last year. And two thirds as much mill by-products.

Since it appears that the reduction in poultry and turkeys will be much more than 15%, it looks like we might get by fine. But what a fight it was! In fact, the reduction will be much more than 15%, according to reliable reports we get. For instance, Gene Fisher tells us that they conducted a sort of poll down at Kellogg recently, and whereas 50,000 turkeys were raised in that community last year, it appears there will be very little more than 13,000 this year.

Chicken hatching eggs are still going into cold storage at a rapid rate. The "Gummen" is fixin' for to support the price of your old hens, which they want you to sell. They will pay 18.3c per lb. dressed, too. So it looks like the skids are greased for another egg shortage next fall. But, don't worry! The good old OPA won't let the price get too high.
