Manchuria.

MANCHURIA is eastern Asia's richest and most productive area. The Russians took it from the Japs in a ten-day war after we had broken the back of Japanese military power.

WE DON'T want Manchuria for ourselves, of course. Our adventure in the Philippines cured us finally of imperialistic ambitions.

We want Manchuria turned back to the Chinese, to help in building up a strong and prosperous China, with which we can trade HONESTLY in open competition with the rest of the world, relying upon our manufacturing skills and industrial techniques to meet whatever competition may develop.

You are familiar with the term "open door in China," which next to the Monroe Doctrine is our oldest and best-established foreign policy. What it means is a fair chance and no shotgun favors for anybody.

That is an American policy for which none of us needs to make any apologies. It is a part of our best tradition.

WATCH Iran, but don't get too much stirred up over it. Our position as to Iran is merely a MATTER OF PRINCIPLE with us. Our REAL interest lies in China, of which the Manchurian question is an integral part.

As matter of fact, our "position" (a fancy diplomatic word) in both Iran and Manchuria isn't historically consistent. When we were on the make (as the Russians are now) we did in Texas EXACTLY what the Russians are doing in Azerbaijan and apparently would like to do in Manchuria.

With tacit approval by Washington, Americans poured into Mexican Texas, stirred up a revolt and established the Texas republic, which (after a short war with Mexico) we ANNEXED. As a part of the war settlement, we TOOK most of what is now Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada and Colorado.

The Mexican war settlement confirmed what we had done in California, where our tactics had been quite similar to those we employed in Texas.

OUR excuse is that we were then young and acquisitive, with a yen for all the territory that joined us. Now—older, wiser, RICHER and more philosophical—we can afford to look down our noses at land grabbers.

(Don't look for diplomacy to be consistent. As Machiavelli told us so clearly and so cynically 400 years ago, the standards of decency, fairness and consistency that are expected from INDIVIDUALS are NOT expected from nations.)

IN OUR own changing outlook on international morality (as we grow up) we can find reassurance as to Russia in the more distant future (after she grows up.)

Present-day Russia is young and full of acquisitive vim—as we were a century ago. As she grows older and wiser (and RICHER) she will doubtless calm down—may even in her turn become impatient with land-grabbing (by somebody else).

The touchy period will come while she is growing up.

WHATEVER you do, stay clear-eyed as to communism. It ISN'T a better system than

OUR BUILDING BOOM

Visitors in Roseburg speak with amazement at the tremendous amount of new construction, particularly private residential building, in progress in this area. One sees a new home being built every few blocks in all of the city's residential areas. Hundreds of new homes, either recently occupied or in process of erection, are to be seen in every direction. New business quarters are being developed. A number of residences along South Stephens Street, the Pacific Highway route through town, are being prepared for removal to new locations to open up business sites.

In normal times, our present condition would be termed a building boom, which, in fact, it actually is; but the fact we are breaking all records, even in a time of extreme material shortage, is obscured by crucial need, which eclipses the unprecedented rate of construction.

Despite all the new homes, our housing shortage grows more critical daily. While new business quarters are under construction, dozens more firms are trying to find locations.

One interesting fact connected with new construction in the Roseburg area is that residential building is of permanent type. Termination of the war brought to an end plans to install the first of a projected series of federal housing units in Roseburg. Prior to approving emergency public housing for the Roseburg area, however, federal agencies, recognizing the dire need for home construction, became most cooperative in issuance of priorities for dwelling construction, and, as a result, Roseburg obtained a head start in private, permanent, home building.

We have been particularly impressed by the ingenuity with which home builders have by-passed material shortages. It is to be regretted that here in a community abundant with timber and sawmills our builders have been forced to devise substitutes for wood. But they have been most ingenious in planning homes using a minimum of scarce items and have produced most attractive and comfortable homes through liberal use of substitutes.

At least 1,000 new dwelling units are needed in Roseburg now. Industries committed to this area promise new jobs which would necessitate living quarters for 1,000 new workers and their families. This gives some idea of the problem we face, despite our current building program.

While we can take pride in present development, and in the envious amazement with which visitors view our community, we cannot relax our efforts to speed construction to new heights.

We hope something will be done by our sawmill industry to divert as much of its product as possible into local distribution, for the need is great. We realize we do not have local facilities for many items of finished lumber required in home construction. We are aware, too, that new OPA price regulations make it difficult for mills to produce profitably for local markets. However, our builders have shown their ability to use rough lumber in home production. There is a constantly increasing demand for lumber suitable for home construction. Our mills could be doing a valuable community service, if they would channel into local markets as large a portion of their output as possible, even though some sacrifice might be entailed.

Representative or Pressure Group Role Question Is Raised

A recent editorial in the News-Review entitled "Political Slaves" was worthy of most careful consideration. One wonders whether our country is to be governed by our legally elected representatives, or by pressure groups that are interested in only one segment of society. Is it to be the "land of the free" or a land of the few?

Reports from Washington tell us that certain groups asked Senator Wayne Morse and certain other senators to stage a filibuster against the Case bill in Congress, an attempt to stifle or prevent discussion in the Senate of an important measure already passed by the House.

The widespread strikes, often accompanied by violence, that are sweeping over our country and paralyzing business, are giving us a "black eye" in the sight of the rest of the world. The laboring man must have his rights, but the employer, too, must have his rights.

We are all happy to have a new industry such as the Umpqua Plywood Company established in our community. It means additional development of our resources, and employment for more people. Yet we wonder if this plant will be suddenly shut down, its production stopped some fine morning on account of some difference between the management and its employees, or between rival groups of workers, as has so often occurred in other places. Here's sincerely hoping this may not be the case. My earnest wish for this enterprise would be that its management and its employees regard each other as friends and co-workers, and treat each other accordingly. That would insure real success.

Two great railway brotherhoods have announced their intention of going on strike in the near future. This may tie up the railway lines of the entire nation. Eighteen other railway brotherhoods have adjusted any differences between them and the railway companies by quiet, peaceable negotiations that did not make the headlines. How much more sensible, unselfish and patriotic was this latter course.

I wish that every employer and employee might read Ludwig Teller's article in Reader's Digest for March, "Picket-Line Violence Must Be Stopped." It is good counsel for all parties.

Our world is now filled with turmoil. Millions of people are threatened with famine and starvation. There is tremendous need for unselfish action. President Truman said a very true thing the other day, when addressing the convention of the Federal Council of Churches at Columbus, Ohio: "It is no time for greed, selfishness, or intolerance." He stated we must have a great moral and spiritual awakening if our civilization is to escape destruction in this atomic age.
