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Asparagus Crop Periled by Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—The entire California asparagus crop totaling 53,000 tons is threatened with loss by a union cannery dispute. President Truman was informed yesterday.

The State Chamber of Commerce said the asparagus pack is due to start April 1, and in a telegram to the White House appealed for "emergency action" to save it as well as the rest of California's fruit and vegetable pack—about one third of the nation's total pack.

A jurisdictional dispute between AFL and CIO cannery unions for an exclusive contract with canneries, with AFL teamsters refusing to haul produce, has shut down most of Northern California's canning industry.

"The present strike prevents overhauling of machinery and preparation of plants to handle the cannery pack in California which last year, through approximately 100 canneries, totalled 66,000,000 cases valued at \$335,000,000," the chamber said. "This represents approximately 35 per cent of the fruit and vegetable pack of the nation."

Snowslide Blocks G. N. Railway Line

SEATTLE, March 12.—The Great Northern Railway reported all traffic blocked by a huge snowslide which engulfed its tracks through the Cascade mountains at Scenic. Wire communications were cut, and few details were available beyond the fact no one was reported injured and that the avalanche was some 300 feet long and 25 to 30 feet deep, and occurred 100 yards from the west portal of the line's Cascade tunnel.

At the same time, the Northern Pacific Railroad reported a main line derailment of six cars of a westbound extra at Selah, about five miles west of Yakima, Wash. The train was derailed here to carry troops East when it struck a broken rail. Damage was repaired quickly.

Traffic still was being detoured today around the scene of a Great Northern derailment of an east-bound extra, five miles west of Bonners Ferry, Idaho, late yesterday, five cars overturned but no one was hurt.

Farmer War Vets Given Building Materials Aid

Farmers who are veterans of World War II may receive help in obtaining housing materials through priorities granted by the Civilian Production Administration. Applications should be made to the nearest Federal Housing Administration office.

Reserved for veteran's housing are part of the total production of common and face brick, clay sewer pipe, structural tile, gypsum board, gypsum lath, cast iron soil pipe and fittings, cast iron radiation, bathtubs, lumber and millwork.

Heavy Snow Impedes South Santiam Traffic

SALEM, March 12.—Heavy snow fell last night in the mountain passes, with the State Highway Commission announcing the South Santiam Highway is almost impassable.

The commission said it is difficult to get traffic through on the South Santiam west of Santiam Junction because of heavy snow and rain, road crews being unable to keep the holes, where the road surface is breaking, filled with gravel.

ers (including interest and taxes) reaching another new 25-year high. At 178 per cent of the 1910-14 average, the parity index was up 1 point from a month earlier and 6 points above a year ago.

The general level of prices received for farm products also rose one point from a month earlier with sharp increases in rice, truck crops, cattle and cotton, and moderate increases in fruit and other grain prices more than offsetting the sharp drop in egg prices and minor downturns in tobacco and dairy products. The index of prices received by farmers stood at 207 per cent of its 1909-14 average in mid-February, 8 points above the February 1945 level, and at the 25-year high reached in December 1925.

Ball Bearing Firms Face Federal Suit

CLEVELAND, March 12.—Indictments charging six ball bearing companies and three individuals with criminal price-fixing in violation of anti-trust laws were returned yesterday by a special federal grand jury in Cleveland.

The indictments climaxed an 18-month investigation by the Department of Justice into locking friction ball bearing concerns in the United States, Sweden, Germany, France, England and Latin America.

Corporations indicted were: General Motors Corp., Detroit; SKF Industries, Inc., Philadelphia; Marlin-Rockwell Corp., Jamestown, N. Y.; Farnir Bearing Co., New Britain, Conn.; Federal Bearings Co., Inc., Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and Norma-Hoff

man Bearings Corp., Stamford, Conn.
