\$15 Million Fund Ready For Wildlife Projects

NEW YORK, March 13.—(AP)—With four years of war bringing wide-spread termination to many federal aid-to-nature projects, the U. S. Treasury now has a backlog of almost \$15,000,000 earmarked for benefit of the nation's wildlife. Robert M. Rutherford of the U. S. Wildlife Service said today: "This fund, accumulated from the excise tax on arms and ammunition," Rutherford said, "has made possible uncounted advancements in wildlife management. Almost 650,000 acres of land have been purchased by the fund to provide management areas, refuges and winter-ranges."

Approximately \$3,000,000 will be spent during the coming fiscal year. States participating must match government expenditures by 25 per cent.

Wilson River Highway Closed by Slide, Report

SALEM, Ore., March 13.—(AP)—The Wilson River highway, between Portland and Tillamook, was closed today by a slide a half mile west of McNamar's Camp, which is 27 miles east of Tillamook. State Highway Engineer Baldock said.

He could not estimate when the South Santiam highway, closed yesterday by snow and a soft roadbed west of Santiam Junction, could be reopened, as the severe snowstorm continued today. There was 17 inches of new snow at Santiam Junction.

The heavy snowfall made travel hazardous in all mountain areas.

Frenzied Mob Repulsed At Hanging of Pro-Nazis

BUDAPEST, March 13.—(AP)—A crowd of 8,000 hysterical Hungarians saw Ferenc Szalasi, prime minister of Hungary during the German occupation, executed by strangulation yesterday in company with three other pro-Nazi leaders.

While the screaming mob watched the contortions of the four condemned men, 4,000 others who could not get into the jail smashed their way through two doors in an effort to see the execution. They were finally checked after Hungarian police fired rifles into the air.

The three who died with

Szalasi were Josef Gega, former Nazi organizer; Karoly Beregffy-Kergeran, former minister of war, and Gabor Vajna, former minister of the interior.
