period of comparative labor peace. On that point, we all FERVENTLY HOPE he is right.

Heavens knows we need a long period of peace in industry, with resulting huge production of THINGS.

Only that can pull the world out of the stagnant bog in which it has seemed to be stuck.

THE General Motors strike alone, which ran something like 114 days, is estimated to have cost a BILLION DOLLARS in lost wages sales and commissions.

That isn't surprising. War is always costly—and modern strikes closely approximate war.

At the moment, the Russian situation looks better in Manchuria, where the Reds are again reported to be GETTING OUT, and worse in Iran, where the Soviet armed column (armed, incidentally, with American Sherman tanks) that left Azerbaijan is reported to be swinging westward toward the TURKISH border.

(Remember that the Dardanelles problem, which hasn't as yet been touched, is one of the hottest spots of the final peace settlement. Russia has always wanted these strategic straits, has been foiled over and over in her efforts to obtain them, and now HAS THE POWER to enforce her historic demand for control and use of them.)

RUSSIAN newspapers (controlled by the Soviet government and saying only what the government TELLS them to say) are talking tough.

They are asserting that the United States intends to maintain in the postwar period huge armed forces such as have never been maintained in the peacetime history of the United States.

On the other side of the propaganda game, British Foreign Secretary Bevin says that Britain will REGRET any settlement between Russia and Iran that "appears to be extracted from the Tehran government while Soviet forces still occupy this country."

It would be easy to get excited about this Russian situation. You'd better keep your fingers crossed and wait. In all big deals, there is a lot of bluffing on both sides—and what is under way now is a BIG deal, involving the shape of the world to come for long generations.

A DUTY TO THE PUBLIC

Milk producers in the Roseburg area are reported again threatening a strike in sympathy with producers in the Portland area to secure OPA action on demands for price increases. We sincerely hope thorough consideration will be given before drastic action is taken.

We cannot deny to producers of food the same privileges in use of the strike weapon as are granted producers of manufactured goods. But an important distinction should not be overlooked.

When organized labor goes out on strike, its action usually is based upon issues concerning which management and labor are unable to reach agreement.

Food producers, however, would be striking directly against the public's welfare and safety. Management in such case is the federal government, which, through OPA, has set a price unsatisfactory to the producer.

The milk producer and dairymen fall into the classification of public utilities—they render a service and thus have a duty and responsibility to discharge.

We cannot blame milk producers for being irked by OPA delays. Here in our own area we have had ample demonstration of OPA procrastination in adjusting milk prices.

OPA control over milk and milk prices, as we see it, is a direct invasion of state's rights. Our United States Supreme Court has turned out some very peculiar decisions on somewhat similar issues, but here is one in which contravention of state's rights, through enforcement of federal executive decree in direct supercedence over an act of the people, is, we believe, most clearly evident.

We would like to see the officials of the State of Oregon make a test case out of the current situation. Oregon has a milk control system set up by legislative act and placed under control of the State Department of Agriculture.

We might take a liking, but at least we would have the satisfaction of knowing we had the courage to demand some recognition of our constitutional rights.

In the meantime we would urge our milk producers, despite their impatience, to give thought to public necessity and welfare and not to use the vicious strike weapon injudiciously.

Previously the Lebanon Warriors, with Lynn Hamilton making a sensational tournament exhibition of his one-handed push shots for 21 total, dropped into fourth place by turning the Rainier Columbian 35 to 31.

In the opening game Saturday, the Hillsboro Spartans rallied around Bob Amacher, their 6-foot 7 1/2 inch center, to sub the Astoria Fishermen 44 to 32.

SALEM, March 18.—(AP)—About 85 per cent of Oregon's citizens live in areas where they have county or municipal library service. Miss Eleanor Stephens, state librarian, says.

Those who don't have this service can use the state library. The county and municipal libraries have 1,570,698 books and 326,388 borrowers, with a circulation of 4,441,392 books during the year ended last June 30.

Miss Stephens showed that the average person living where there is a county library reads five books a year, compared with an average of four for the entire state.
