

Fir Operators, IWA Slated for Contract Parley

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18. —(AP)—Representatives of the CIO International Woodworkers of America and Fir Operators will discuss industry-wide negotiations of a new contract at conference here tomorrow.

H. D. Weaver, secretary manager of the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, reported the industry-wide feature of the contract now being negotiated would be discussed, but said progress was stalled in a dispute over status of the termination order of February canceling contracts expiring April 1. Weaver said the cancellation cleared the way for negotiations to eliminate wartime clauses. He said however the "union claims the contracts continue in force and effect after April 1, so long as the parties remain in negotiation."

Union president, James W. Faddling said the IWA wanted the canceled contract reinstated during negotiations and accused the operators of refusing to discuss the contract within the time limit set.

Willamette Flood Control Sought

WASHINGTON, March 18.—(AP)—Flood threat in the Willamette Valley of Oregon is "one of the most serious flood emergencies in the entire United States," says Senator Morse.

He recommended an appropriation of \$280,000 for flood control work to protect Eugene, Ore. He said that last December

the Willamette flood did a minimum of \$6,000,000 damage and more than 2,000,000 tons of rich soil used for truck gardens were washed away.

The senator asserted one reason floods are so disastrous in the Willamette Valley is because thousands of acres of great timberlands were cut for war purposes, permitting fast runoff of rain and snow.

Morse said floods in Amazon Creek, which flows through Salem, are damaging city business property.

Morse previously asked Congress for funds for dams and channel works along the Willamette.

Krug Sworn In

WASHINGTON, March 18.—(AP)—Julius A. Krug took office today as Secretary of the Interior, and immediately announced that Oscar L. Chapman would be nominated undersecretary.

Chapman, a 49-year-old Colorado who has served as acting secretary since the resignation of Harold L. Ickes, has been an assistant secretary almost 13 years.

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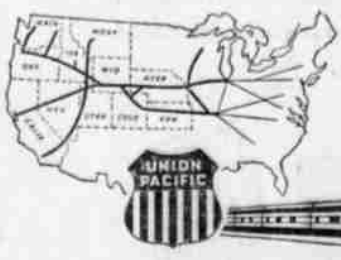
