Farm Credit Aids For Vets Eased in Senate Report

WASHINGTON, March 20.—(AP)—The Senate agriculture committee today approved legislation easing government credit aids for veterans who want to buy farms.

The bill of Senator Bankhead amends the 1937 Bankhead-Jones farm tenant act under which the farm security administration makes loans for farm purchases. It removes, so far as veterans are concerned, the restrictions in the original act that:

Loans may be made only to persons with farming experience. Loans may be made only on farms of a size such that operations likely will return the purchaser a living.

E. L. Bartlett, delegate from Alaska, sought an amendment authorizing FSA loans for improvements to homesteads in Alaska. Bankhead told him that if he could get the Interior and Agriculture Departments to agree on the wording of such an amendment it would be considered when the measure comes up on the Senate floor.

Bartlett explained that Alaska's particular problem on FSA loans is this:

Of the land in Alaska is still in the public domain. A homesteader requires five years to perfect title to land he settles. During those five years, the FSA can make him no loan for improvements because the homesteaders cannot give a mortgage on the land.

Bartlett wanted an amendment permitting the FSA loan with a lien on the improvements as security.

The Interior Department administers public lands while FSA is under the Agriculture Department.
