Spokesmen for Starving Nations Appeal for Food

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., March 20.—(AP)—Spokesmen for China and Greece told in stark and simple terms yesterday the story of starvation and suffering in their lands and appealed for continued aid to prevent the present crisis from becoming an even greater calamity.

China's Tsinifu F. Tsang reported to delegates from 47 nations at UNRRA's council meeting that "famine and starvation actually has begun" in his country—so acute in some areas that people are eating grass and clay.

"The actual state of affairs is far worse than had been estimated," he asserted. "Food will have to be supplied for another season. But let us all be realistic. We cannot meet more than one half the needs."

Varvaresos, Greek delegate, said that only a "small proportion" of the Greek needs have been met, and said that people have been dropping in the streets from hunger, children starving from lack of food.

He recounted his country's fight against aggression, and then declared "I feel that I am entitled to ask for Greece a few thousand tons of wheat... to prevent a new calamity."

Yugoslavia Cites Needs

Petrovic, of Yugoslavia, said his country was anxious to take care of itself, but that war damage was so great that Yugoslavia faced prolonged suffering unless UNRRA restored its 1945 level of supplies. He reiterated the small nations' plea for oil, machine parts and other equipment necessary to the restoration of Yugoslav industry.

Brig. Gen. Romulo, of the Philippines, told the delegates the commonwealth had not yet received any help from UNRRA other than \$3,000,000 in direct relief ordered by Lehman, acting on his emergency powers as director general.

Schneider, delegate from France, announced that his government had given UNRRA 150,000,000 francs for 1945 and will shortly vote another 200,000,000 francs for 1946.

The world food problem posed for UNRRA its major immediate problem—whether to recommend sharp curtailment of relief aid to Japan and Germany in order to give preference to treatment to Allied liberated lands.

The issue was flung squarely into the fourth council of the international relief organization by Sir Carl Berendsen, delegate from New Zealand, who insisted that first right to available food resources should go to the victims of Axis aggression.

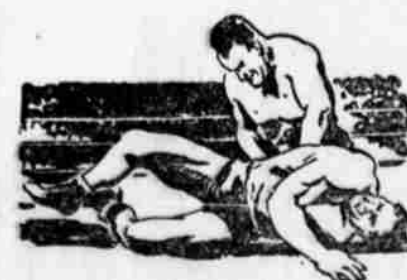
