A DIFFERENT KNOCKING

Building permits in Roseburg last week totalled \$54,000, according to a report from Glenn H. Taylor, fire chief and building inspector.

Since January 1, 1946, permits issued call for more than \$200,000 worth of new construction, remodeling, etc., already more, in less than three full months, than for any entire year since 1928 with the single exception of 1945.

Every prospect is for a record of building construction during the current year far in excess of anything previously known. Plans are being drawn for several large-scale business, commercial and industrial developments, which, if brought to construction stage, should make all previous records look sickly by comparison.

Most daily we hear someone, suddenly awakened to realities of business and industrial progress, ask: "What are we going to do about it?"

It isn't a question, however, of what we are going to do about IT. The question is, what is IT going to do about US?

Some old-timers, for instance, may be able to recall with nostalgia, Harry Pearce's Jackson Street harness shop where, during the course of the day, most of the city's leading business men were wont to gather about the old pot-bellied stove and settle affairs of city, state and nation; where story-telling was an art; a place where a wealth of pioneer history was wasted for lack of a chronicler.

It does not take a long memory to recall the old Strawberry Festivals, competitive turkey marketing weeks, and the fountain the W.C.T.U. ladies installed at Main and Cass streets to convince some of the town's populace that water actually could be used for drinking purposes.

Some of us hate to be shaken out of the familiar spirit of things. We yearn for the good old days when we could walk down the street, calling everyone by his or her first name, or when we could find a parking space for the Model-T anywhere along any block.

Some of us have tried to close our eyes to what is happening about us. We have not fully awakened to the fact that we have been caught up in a boom which actually hasn't yet obtained a good start.

We suddenly hear demands for street signs in a town where we've been familiar with streets for years and can't understand why people need signs to find their way around, and why, in fact, they should want to move around. We hear talk of a city manager—one of them hi-falutin' fellers with an engineering degree, to come in and do the work our city councils have been doing free of charge for years.

Our old landmarks are being torn down. New businesses are springing up like mushrooms. We don't know hardly anyone we meet on the streets. We can't even get together enough of the old-timers any more for a game of pool or pinocle.
