FEDERAL POWER COMMISSION, Washington, D. C. Public notice is hereby given, pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Power Act (16 U. S. C. 791-825), that The California Oregon Power Company, of Yreka, California, has made application for license for proposed major Project No. 1927, on the North Umpqua River, in Douglas County, Oregon, consisting of a diversion dam about 45 feet high with over-all length of about 588 feet, including a main earthfill section, a short concrete gravity dam, and a concrete overflow spillway section; conduits with aggregate length of approximately 7,980 feet consisting of wood-stave pipe, concrete-lined tunnel, and steel penstock; and a powerhouse containing two turbines, each with capacity of 18,000 horsepower, and two generators with capacity of 12,500 kilowatts each.
