Charge of Larceny Faced by Woman

Nell Hockensmith, 48, Camas Valley housewife, was released on \$500 bail yesterday after she was charged with larceny in a dwelling house, Justice of the Peace Thomas C. Hartfield reported this morning. She asked for a preliminary hearing which has been set for 10 A. M. Friday, Hartfield said.

Mrs. Hockensmith was arrested by sheriff's deputies on the complaint of Lloyd W. Cummings, who alleged that she entered his house at Lookingglass, March 18, and took bedding, cooking utensils, and other personal property. Monroe Porter, 51, farmer, was released on \$500 for an alleged assault on Mike Gomes, Roseburg, with a dangerous weapon, Hartfield said. A charge of assault and battery against Porter was dismissed by District Attorney H. A. Canaday, the justice reported.

Eugene Earl McNutt, 23, truck driver, was jailed for 30 days and fined \$100 on the charge of being drunk on a public highway to which he pleaded guilty.

Two traffic fines were levied by Hartfield yesterday: Ellis Neavall, unit overload, \$10, and Lloyd E. Hughes, speeding, \$20.

Counseling Agency Urged To Halt Family Breakups

PORTLAND, March 27.—(AP)—A family counseling agency to cope with the rising divorce and juvenile delinquency rate in Portland was urged by Judge Donald Long of the court of domestic relations in an address at the YMCA last night.

"It is hard to believe, but I have handled 2,000 divorce cases through my court in the five months I have been here," he declared in reporting the number per month had doubled in the time since he entered military service.

"We could deny these divorces, but we can't make people live together," he asserted in advocating a family counseling agency.

HERMISTON, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—The body of Oliver Rathbun, about 62 years of age, was found suspended by the neck from a loop of telephone wire in his feed barn on his farm near Hermiston Monday.

Acting Coroner E. P. Dodd reported the case one of suicide, although no note was left. He said it was known that Rathbun had been in ill health.

U. S., Britain Agree on Paying of Obligations

WASHINGTON, March 27.—(AP)—The United States and Britain today announced nine agreements for settling lend-lease and other wartime obligations, under which this country will be paid about \$650,000,000 plus interest by New Year's day, 2002.

Materials Aid Granted

In another rapid follow-up, the agency was expected to grant "reconversion priorities" today to help manufacturers of scarce building materials obtain needed machinery and equipment.

This action would permit makers of all 13 of the critically scarce materials and supplies to expand their operations and thus speed up home building.

The materials to be affected, a CPA official said, are lumber, bricks, radiators, bathtubs, tile, concrete blocks, castiron sewer pipe, clay pipe, millwork, gypsum board and lathe, hardwood flooring, softwood plywood and prefabricated houses, sections, and panels.

Housewives who require milk for small children or invalids may secure supplies at their dairies, Nichols said. They will be required to produce ration books or birth certificates to establish age of children for whom milk is claimed to be necessary, Nichols announced. Distributors will be furnished with enough milk to supply these needs, as well as requirements of hospitals, county home, school lunch program, etc. The remainder of the supply will be diverted to creameries and cheese factories.

Portland Assured 25 Perct. More Milk Pending New Parley

PORTLAND, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—Milk producers here early today restored 25 per cent of normal deliveries to consumers and full quotas to hospitals after conferences yesterday and last night on their day old strike against OPA failure to meet price increase demands.

The committee representing the four producers groups in the area controlling 82 per cent of the Portland milk supply announced the new decision would stay in effect until after a conference with regional OPA officials in San Francisco.

A spokesman for the dairymen said a committee would leave today for San Francisco for a rehearing on their demands for a 20-cent boost per butterfat pound. The OPA Monday granted a 6-cent increase in an eleventh hour decision, but dairymen insisted it was not enough and yesterday diverted the milk into manufacturers channels.

Quota Law Cited

The decision to modify their earlier full milk stoppage came after State Agriculture Director E. L. Peterson announced diversion of the milk supply to cheese and powdered milk would cost the dairymen their city delivery quotas. Peterson explained under state law any withdrawal from the market automatically canceled quotas. At the same time Mayor Earl Riley warned milk suppliers in neighboring areas would be encouraged to make bulk delivery to the city.

Consumers Protest

Pressure against the strike also built up among consumer groups. One petition, signed by officers of 42 women's clubs, appealed to Gov. Earl Snell to assure milk for Portland and asked buyers to refuse to buy any milk unless all were supplied.

The dairymen have been receiving 95 cents a butterfat pound and sought \$1.15. The OPA order allowed 24 cents a hundredweight, or 6 cents a butterfat pound. It also granted a half-cent a quart retail price boost.

SALEM, March 27.—(AP)—Salem dairies today were making deliveries to hospitals only, but they

were selling at their plants to persons who had doctor's letters saying it was needed for children or sick persons.

Stores here were selling canned milk only to persons with babies.

Store owners said there has been a run on canned milk for the past three weeks.
