

West Washington In Clutch of Snow

SEATTLE, March 27.—(AP)—Old man winter took a surprise curtain call on Western Washington's stage from Bellingham to Tacoma and his unhappy subjects shivered at the scene from late last night through this morning.

At Seattle, snow fluttered down through the night, leaving a white blanket as deep as three inches on some of the high spots.

At Tacoma, state highway patrolmen reported early this morning the snow was falling so thickly they had to get out and clean their windshields when the wipers failed to do so.

In the high Cascades, a mighty avalanche which roared down Monday on a quarter mile stretch of the Snoqualmie pass near the summit was still not cleared to day as highway plows labored through the night and new snow and slides threatened the men operating the equipment.

Freight trucking companies were the most unhappy of the hundreds of persons held up by road blocks on the pass. They estimated the slide was costing them \$40,000 a day. Trucking concerns said nearly 200 heavy trucks and trailers were tied up at both ends of the blockade.

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Basketball Rules Undergo 4 Changes

NEW YORK, March 28.—(AP)—The basketball rule prohibiting re-entry of any player in the last four minutes of a game—a coach's headache during its one season in the book—went out the window today and a more liberalized version was ready to take its place.

The modification of the four-minute rule was one of four minor changes made in the case sport's legislation by the national basketball committee of the United States and Canada which closed its annual rules-making session here yesterday.

Under the new rules, one re-

entry per player will be allowed during the last four minutes of a game and the clock will be stopped automatically throughout that period whenever the ball is dead.

The committee also decided to:

1. Make the use of transparent backboards optional and submit recommendations for markings on such backboards at a later date.
2. Make it mandatory to call a "jump ball" six feet in from the boundary whenever the ball goes out after having been touched by two opposing players simultaneously, or if the officials can't agree who touched it last, or if their vision was blocked and they don't know who touched it last.
3. Amend the running rule so that a player who comes to a legal stop with feet parallel can use either foot as his pivot foot.

All recommendations for new rules to place a further check on extra tall players, such as adding two feet to the height of the goals and widening the free throw lanes, were turned down.

Vardaman's Confirmation Voted by Senate Group

WASHINGTON, March 27.—(AP)—A Senate Banking Subcommittee today recommended confirmation of Commodore James K. Vardaman, Jr., for a 14-year term on the Federal Reserve Board of Governors.

Chairman Radcliffe informed the full Banking Committee that the subcommittee had voted without dissent in favor of confirmation.

Radcliffe said serious charges had been made against Vardaman, President Truman's naval aide, and these had been "studied very carefully" and at great length by the subcommittee.

"We have come to the conclusion that the charges were not sustained," Radcliffe said.

President Truman sent the nomination of Vardaman, a former St. Louis banker and shoe manufacturer, to the Senate January 21. The post pays \$15,000 a year salary.

The charges to which Radcliffe referred resulted largely from reorganization proceedings involving the Vardaman Shoe Company, which Vardaman once headed.
