## Pink-Eye Threat Again Prevalent

Recent increase in number of cases of kerato-conjunctivitis, commonly known as "oriental" or "shipyard" pink-eye, indicates danger of an epidemic, Dr. A. C. Seely, Roseburg eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, warned today.

The eye disease, which made its first appearance in Pacific Coast shipyards early in 1941, has persisted and spread throughout the country, Dr. Seely reports. Few cases have been reported in recent months in the Douglas

As the disease is infectious and can be contracted only through contact, it is possible to avoid it by exercising caution, Dr. Seely said. A person should avoid touching his eyes with his fingers unless the hands have been thoroughly cleansed, as infection is contracted by touching or handling some object previously touched by some person suffering from the disease. The virus then being placed in the eyes by contact from the hands, Dr. Seely reports.

## Oregon Greeks Plead for Dodecanese Isles Award

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—Scores of telegrams from Greek organizations and individuals in Oregon are being received by Senator Cordon urging him to support the resolution introduced by Senator Pepper, asking that the Dodecanese islands be awarded to Greece.

The Greek orthodox community of Oregon cited the resistance of Greece to Germany and her stand with the allies during the war as one of the reasons she should be awarded the islands.
