Tighter Traffic Check Is Planned

An intensive traffic safety campaign, scheduled to begin May 15, for a six weeks' period, was planned by the International Association of Police Chiefs which met in Medford this week. Chief of Police Erwin Short said this morning.

Last year, in a similar traffic safety drive, only brakes were checked, but this year, everything will be emphasized, Short said, and tickets on which mechanical defects are checked will be issued, and owners of cars required to have them corrected.

Short pointed out that last year, as a national average, seven out of every 100 cars checked had defective brakes. This year traffic accidents have increased 40 per cent over last year's figure.

Civic organizations are to co-operate with the safety campaign, Short said.

The police chief returned today from the conference which was addressed by police authorities from all parts of the state and nation.

Clouds Darken Prospects For Roadman's Horses

Dark clouds over Mt. Nebo this morning were being eyed somewhat apprehensively by County Commissioner H. B. Roadman as he swung around in his swivel chair from his desk in his office, to the windows behind him. Today's sunshiny weather, first in several days, meant that he could put his two saddle horses out to pasture instead of keeping them in the barn.

The commissioner's two horses are kept in private pastures near the county barns, and when weather keeps them inside, they become "too frisky" to ride.

Roadman was hoping to be able to put his horses out to exercise this afternoon, but, he explained, dark clouds in the west—dark clouds over Mt. Nebo—often mean rain for Roseburg. His horses might have to stay in today despite this morning's blue skies.
