Unlicensed Auto Wrecking Business Draws Fine of \$50

Roy M. Rose, mechanic, pleaded guilty in justice court yesterday to operating an auto wrecking business without a license, and was fined \$50 by Justice of the Peace Thomas C. Hartfield. Rose's business was located at the foot of Rice Hill on the Pacific Highway, south of Yoncalla, Hartfield said.

Licenses for auto wrecking establishments are issued by the state on recommendation of the county court. County Judge D. N. Busenbark said Rose's application had been disapproved because his junk yard was located on the highway. If he had moved back in the hills, off the highway, Busenbark said, the license application would have been approved.

Rose apparently had been carrying on his wrecking business in disregard of licensing regulations, Hartfield said.

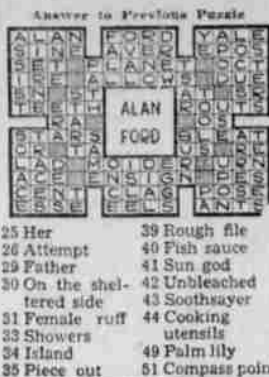

Battle Royal of 5 Wrestlers Dated On Next Bill Here

The most brilliant galaxy of wrestling stars ever gathered together in the Roseburg Armory arena in the history of the mat sport will be presented here Saturday night by Matchmaker Don Owen. Attraction of the five top-flight matmen will be a \$250 purse offered the winner of a "battle royal."

Personnel of the red-hot free-for-all will be Tony Ross, Jack Kiser, Sgt. Bob Kenaston, Joe Lyman and Angelo Martinelli.

Three of the crappier appeared here last week in one of the most colorful programs of the season. Kenaston made his local debut by scoring an impressive victory over Billy Rayburn, but the rugged matman suffered a cut eye in the skirmish. The injury will not, however, keep him out of the rough-and-tumble brawl for the \$250 purse this week.

Kiser defeated Ross in the other match here last week-end and the heated rivalry between the two light-heavyweights is expected to flare up again when all five matmen step into the ring Saturday night. Ross will have to watch his step because he stepped on Kiser's toes during last week's class and may be tossed out on his ear unless he follows orthodox wrestling technique in the battle royal.

The match will actually be a three-in-one performance. All five matmen battle simultaneously until only two contenders remain on their feet, escaping knockouts or having their shoulders pinned to the mat for the necessary ten-second count.

First man eliminated will retire for the evening, but the next two men ousted will return for a 30-minute, one-fall engagement for a special \$50 prize. The two finalists will battle in a two-out-of-three match to determine the winner of the coveted main event purse.

The five-man clash is certain to attract a capacity crowd and fans are urged to make their reservations early in the week.

Turner Gets Only Draw Because of Foul Blows
