Marketing essays have been sent in by approximately 150 of the 225 boys and girls enrolled for 4-H marketing. Essays were to have been completed and in to the County Club Agents' office by April 1st. The deadline set for receiving completed essays is April 10th. Any boy or girl not completing by then will not be eligible to attend the day's program on April 20th. The program for Marketing Day will include educational tours in the morning starting at 9:00 A. M. In the afternoon the club members will be guests of Mr. and Mrs. Donn Radabaugh and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce at a free show. The marketing day program is sponsored by the Roseburg Chamber and various business concerns in Roseburg.
