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HISTORY REPEATS

Fish wheels in the Columbia River are believed to have taken more than 100 million pounds of fish during the 50 years prior to 1927, the date when they were banned by state law.

It took the State of Oregon 20 years, filled with wrangling, to ban use of fish wheels, Olsen reports, but alarm over dwindling salmon runs eventually brought about their removal.

It would seem our experience with automatic fish wheels, which scooped salmon from the river in prodigious numbers until supply was threatened, would serve to promote discontinuance of other destructive methods.

Just as fish wheels threatened only a comparatively few years ago to bring about extinction of salmon runs in the Columbia River, net fishing today is rapidly destroying salmon in our coastal streams.

An opportunity will be given next November to test public sentiment on this issue. Conservationists are hopeful sufficient public interest will be aroused to bring about at least partial correction of the existing situation.

House Bill 378, passed by a large majority in the last legislature, and referred to the voters on petitions sponsored by commercial interests, is a measure which would shorten net fishing season on all coastal streams, except the Columbia.

The feature article relating the history of fish wheels should receive more attention than that given an interesting narrative. It relates how early users of fish wheels made fortunes from the devices, but how, because of continued use, fish runs were depleted until the wheels no longer were of great profit.

The same history is in the making today concerning commercial fishing with nets in coastal streams. Few seiners today are receiving enough for their work to make it worth while.

The only profitable fishing operation today is carried on offshore. But offshore fisheries soon will be a thing of the past if salmon runs are depleted in freshwater streams.

We hope everyone will read Mr. Olsen's interesting article in the Oregon Journal magazine section of Sunday, March 31, and will apply conditions of 25 years ago to those existing today.
