Noted Evangelist Dated For Series of Services at Roseburg Baptist Church



Dr. James McGinlay, above, nationally known Scotch evangelist and Bible teacher, will begin a series of services Monday night in the First Baptist Church of Roseburg, to last through Easter Sunday, the Rev. H. P. Scone, pastor, announced today.

Dr. McGinlay's messages have proven "a great blessing to thousands of people," Mr. Scone said. "He is well known for his powerful ministry throughout the length and breadth of the land."

The evangelist was born on the banks of Loch Lomond in Scotland, in 1901, and never entered a church until he was 23 years old. He was a very successful pastor for 13 years in London and Canada, until a few years ago, when he entered full-time evangelistic work.

He is a favorite speaker in Bible conferences all over the country, Dr. Scone said. He has been on the program of the Moody Memorial Church in Chicago and the Church of the Open Door in Los Angeles, year after year, and has spoken in more than 300 other churches scattered across the United States.

"Great church auditoriums have often proved too small for the crowds who came to hear him preach," Mr. Scone said.

OPA Life Extension Report Facing Battle

merce and some other business groups, and followed President Truman's recommendation that the agency be continued for a full year beyond June 30.

But it wrote into the OPA extension bill yesterday these far-reaching revisions:

1. A requirement that OPA restore the retail profit margins it has trimmed for a large number of reconversion items—autos, refrigerators, radios, etc. This revises the OPA cost absorption policy which has required retail outlets to bear a portion of the increased cost of production of markup or discount margins.

2. A directive that price controls be liquidated in various lines as supply comes into balance with demand, with the gradual decontrol responsibility assigned directly to President Truman rather than to OPA.

3. A provision for early termination of the government's \$2,000,000,000 annual subsidy pro-

gram, including payments to reduce consumer food costs. This amendment would slash subsidy payments in the next fiscal year by 25 per cent, or \$500,000,000, and require the government to get out of the subsidy business by June 30, 1947.

4. A repealer for OPA's maximum average price policy by which the agency forces manufacturers to produce low cost clothing.

Rep. Outland (D-Calif.), a committee member, told newsmen these amendments "can be interpreted as saying but one thing: 'The consumer be damned.'"

allied powers to pass on peace pacts for the little Axis nations. But it has been accepted generally that such a meeting could or would accomplish little unless Britain, France, Russia and the United States first reach agreement among themselves upon the treaty terms to be submitted to the "four" conference.

These doubts had reached the point where Russia was advocating postponement of the 21-member peace conference, with France suggesting, too, that a delay might be necessary.

Veteran foreign diplomats in Washington today questioned whether the Byrnes-Paris conference proposal would succeed in averting postponement of the Moscow parley, but they welcomed it as the first top-level attempt to end the disagreements delaying the treaties.

Foreign Policy to Be Universal—Truman

dation stones which hold the promise of a strong nation."

"They are essential if we are to maintain our leadership on the road to peace and freedom," he said.

If the country is to carry out its new world-wide obligations to support the "peace and freedom" that are "the very root of our foreign policy," the President said, "we must remain strong." Asserting this is America's duty under its United Nations membership, he added:

"We can not on one day proclaim our intention to prevent unjust aggression and oppression in the world and the next day call for immediate scrapping of our military might."

Must Assume Leadership
The President said that the United States today is "a strong nation; there is none stronger" and that its strength requires it to "assume leadership and accept responsibility."

It would be a tragic breach of national duty and international faith if, consciously or carelessly, we permitted ourselves ever to be unprepared to fulfill that responsibility," he said.

The Army, he continued, can be "continuously and adequately supplied for another year only by the Selective Service Act."

Either we must keep men abroad whose service entitles them to return home or "we shall turn our backs upon the enemy before the victory is finally assured," he said, and added his assurance that Congress will not choose either alternative.

First Target Next Time
Universal training, Mr. Truman said, will not bring any youth into the Army or Navy in time of peace, but will assure that each individual is trained "to take his place if war unhappily should ever come again."

"No one knows yet what would be needed in terms of infantrymen, artillery, pilots, planes, rockets or bombs "in the atomic era," he continued, but modern war calls for "the total mobilization of all men and all energies."

"Next time—if there must be a next time—we are likely to be the first target," Mr. Truman said.

In proclaiming America's intention to assert its interest in peace and security everywhere, the President reminded:

"Remember that the First World War began in Serbia; that the Peace of Versailles was first broken in Manchuria and that the Second World War began in Poland."
