Blood Plasma Units Returned Here for Civilian Practice

Hospitals and physicians of Douglas County have received 61 dried blood plasma units, the first supply of free life-saving plasma for use in civilian medical practice. Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer, and O. A. Kennerly, Jr., manager of the Red Cross chapter in Douglas County, announced today. The plasma is being returned to the American Red Cross, from the surplus supply of dried blood plasma turned back to the Red Cross by the Army and Navy. The plasma will be available without cost although there may be a charge for professional services in administering it. Distribution within Douglas County is being made by the Douglas County department of health, which will forward more supplies of plasma as needed. The total surplus is approximately 1,250,000 packages, estimated as sufficient to meet the civilian needs of the country for two years. "The war brought home to us how essential readily available blood and plasma are in helping to save lives," Kennerly said. "The use of this plasma will demonstrate the value of having a permanent community civilian blood program. Whole blood is still needed in three out of every four transfusions, so this dried plasma only partly meets the need for blood donations."

Vital Importance Of Air Power Told At Rotary Meeting

Air power is America's first line of defense, James Quick, aviation authority told the Roseburg Rotary Club last week, as he warned that what happened to Japan could also happen to the United States, unless steps are promptly taken to maintain America's technological leadership and world pre-eminence in aviation. Air power is not composed of military air power alone, Quick said, but includes civil as well as military aviation; commercial as well as private flying, and potential as well as existing air power. It includes "the whole aviation capacity—military, commercial, and manufacturing, which compose a dynamic trinity."

Quick represents the Aircraft Industries Association of America with its headquarters in Los Angeles, and was formerly executive assistant in charge of public relations for the North American Aviation, Inc., of Inglewood, Calif. He was also sales executive and advertising representative for the Standard Oil Company of Indiana in Detroit, Mich., for many years. He is considered an aviation authority.

Future "Must" Enjoined A recent jet propulsion plane, he said, exceeded the speed of sound, which is 762 miles an hour. Before 1935, he predicted, "all of you" will be traveling through the air at 1,500 miles per hour and "will think nothing of it."

Airport and air park development is a community must, if towns are to avoid the fate of earlier towns which were allowed to be by-passed by the railroads. "Don't let your town be by-passed," he urged. "Don't let your area become a ghost area."

"Air power is peace power," he said. In detailing current military developments, including jet and rocket propulsion planes traveling at super-sonic speeds and self-guided missiles carrying atomic bombs, Quick warned that it is imperative for the United States, which now has the greatest air force in the world, to maintain its scientific research and development, else it will lose its place of pre-eminence in aviation, and national security will be endangered.

Deficit Financing Opposed, Sales Tax Favored by Group

R. R. Clarke, Oakland farmer who was recently elected director of Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., reports that Congressman Harris Ellsworth advised the taxpayer organization that he has "voted and will continue to vote for reduction in government spending, and hopes for the balancing of the national budget at an early date." Directors of Oregon's taxpayers organization voted to urge the state's congressional delegation to stand solidly for a balanced federal budget and challenge 11 billions of proposed spending to put an end to deficit financing. The federal debt, the taxpayer group directors agreed, must be reduced before tax reduction can be expected. Mr. Clarke supported resolutions to continue the 6 per cent limitation in Oregon, to demand that the legislature stop enacting tax levies that are "mandatory" upon counties, and in favor of a sales tax to meet school and other rising costs, rather than high state property tax levies that are being proposed. The nine taxpayer association directors said that a "general sales tax is the only source of sufficiently large new tax revenue that will satisfy the accumulating demands of all competing groups," including higher education, public schools, farmer roads, public welfare, public employee retirement funds and salary demands. A tax levy on gross receipts

of all businesses and occupations, such as has been suggested in place of personal property taxes, was opposed by Mr. Clarke and his associates so long as Oregon taxes net incomes, according to the Portland office of the taxpayer organization.

War Medal Given Pvt. Springstead

UNITED STATES FORCES IN AUSTRIA—Pvt. First Class Joseph M. Springstead, husband of Mrs. Wanda Springstead, 814 Miller Street, Roseburg, Oregon, has been awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious achievement in action on April 18, 1945, in Germany. His mother, Mrs. Ethel Springstead, also makes her home in Roseburg. Assigned overseas with his regiment, the 222d Infantry, in November, 1944, Pvt. Springstead has been awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge in addition to the Bronze Star Medal for participating in the 42d "Rainbow" Division's campaign in Germany and France. Before his induction into the Army in June, 1942, the infantryman was employed by the Union Pacific Railroad Company in Portland, Ore. His organization, the 222d, is a part of Gen. Mark W. Clark's United States Forces in Austria.

Doctors Needed at Portland by Vets Administration

Four physicians are needed in the Portland regional office of the Veterans Administration to serve on rating boards, it was announced today by Abraham Nelson, branch director of the claims service. These physicians will serve on boards which pass on claims for disability made by veterans. The posts carry a starting salary of \$5,180, an increase of \$880 annually over the salary formerly offered.

Under a new ruling, consideration will be given to the employment of physicians who cannot meet present minimum physical standards but who are otherwise qualified. Claims for disability pensions are increasing each month, Nelson said, and veterans' claims will be held up unless more physicians are obtained immediately. The Veterans Administration received 214,896 claims in December, 316,839 in January, and 414,530 in February. Because of the shortage in personnel, only 260,233 claims were adjudicated in February.

Buildings From Former CCC Camp Up for Sale

Twenty portable buildings from the former Elkton CCC camp are being offered for sale by the Oregon and California Revested Lands Administration. It was reported today by J. E. Slattery, district forester for the Roseburg area. These buildings, ranging in size from 10 by 10 to 20 by 130 feet, are of the prefabricated type

and break down into panels 5x7, 5x10 and 5x12 feet. Slattery reports. They are complete with plumbing and lighting fixtures. They have drop siding and are lined with Fir-Tex. 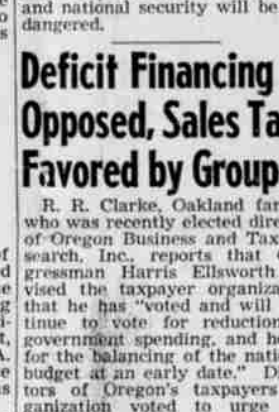
