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Sutherlin Scouts Plan Dedication Of Club Building

SUTHERLIN — With one room rapidly nearing completion, the Sutherlin Girl and Boy Scouts are planning the formal opening of their club building, Wednesday, May 1. A dedication program and potluck dinner for parents, are planned.

The girls of the intermediate troop have had the honor of painting the interior of the room, and will make curtains and clean it up in the next few meetings. The Boy Scouts will clean the grounds and lay out walks and flower beds.

It is hoped that an out-door fireplace, picnic tables and benches may be included. Members of both troops say they wish to thank Patton's Electric Co. for the work of wiring the building; Torrey's Hardware for furnishing light fixtures; Red Diamond Fuel Co. for a load of wood, and others who have assisted "very materially" in the financing the project.

While the building is far from complete, the one room will give room for a limited amount of Scout work, but the main room when completed will answer all needs of both troops and the whole set-up will equal anything of its kind in the state. Work has been slow because of lack of funds and difficulty in purchasing building materials.

Sentence Meted Italian Woman for Killing Briton

ROME, April 8. — (AP) — Miss Lydia Cirillo, described by her attorney as an "innocent victim of love," faced a prison term of four years and one month today for the fatal shooting of a British Army captain who allegedly killed her for a younger Italian woman.

The court ruled that she must serve three and a half years in a mental institution after completing her prison term.

Miss Cirillo's lawyer had maintained she killed "in defense of the honor of Italian women." She testified she shot Capt. Sidney E. Lasch to death after learning he was married and had deserted her for a younger woman.

Coos Bay Water District Illegal, Judge King Rules

COOS BAY, Ore., April 8. — (AP) — The Coos Bay water district which takes in this city and North Bend, has been declared illegal by Circuit Judge King.

Water district commissioners plan to appeal to the State Supreme Court. Judge King said amendments to state law show that legislators did not want cities to join in creating water districts, because the city with heavier population could force a smaller one into the agreement. Last fall a Portland bond attorney questioned the district's legality, refusing to approve a \$675,000 issue to purchase and improve the system.

War Against Nazis Not Over, M'Narney Warns

FRANKFURT, Germany, April 8. — (AP) — Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, American commander in the European theater, told occupation troops Saturday in an Army Day address that the war did not end with the surrender. "It continues," he said, "in ideologies difficult to eradicate—in a struggle to replace the destructive ideas of Nazism with the constructive ideas of democracy."

McNarney, addressing forces which include many replacements who have never seen com-

bat and which only a week ago nipped a widespread Nazi subversive movement, told his men: "In many respects the job of the occupation soldier is more difficult than that of the soldier in combat."

Volcano Razes Nippon Village, Doooms Another

TOKYO, April 8. — (AP) — Molten lava, flowing slowly down Mt. Sakurajima in a stream 100 meters wide and 20 to 30 meters deep, destroyed Kurogami village, Prof. Ogihara of Tokyo Imperial University reported today after a survey.

He said Airuma village definitely appears doomed. The volcano, last active in 1914, began erupting about two weeks ago. No lives were lost because the

lava approached at low speed. He said the area covered by lava probably would not regain fertility for 1,000 years.
