Truman-Congress Split Amplified By Political Year

WASHINGTON—What caused the President Truman-Congress honeymoon to go piffy?

You can get as many answers as you ask political leaders and Washington observers, starting with the traditional antagonism between the legislative and executive branches of our government.

Some of it no doubt was due to President Truman's statement in his September, 1945, message to Congress, when he flatly and unequivocally laid down the administration domestic policy.

"The objectives which we seek in our long-range plans," he said then, "were summarized by the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt over a year and a half ago in the form of the Economic Bill of Rights."

The groan that went up from the long-time anti-Roosevelt boys was heard all over the land. Their hopes that the new President would turn to the conservative right were given a good dose of cold water with that statement. The conservative Democrats swung away and the fight was on. Foes Seize on Blunders

In his first year in office, President Truman has made some mistakes. He would be the first to admit it.

The opening he gave the opposition in insisting on Edwin A. Pauley for undersecretary of the Navy you could have driven a sledge-hammer through. And that's just what the opposition did.

The administration handling of the labor policies have been a source of disunion.

But results show, as in Reconstruction Director John W. Snyder's recent report, that production for civilians now is at the highest level in the nation's history, that it has been more a

quarrel over means than a blocking of the ends desired.

In some of his appointments, some of his little holiday trips, some of his hasty statements, President Truman has laid himself open to the kind of political sniping that hurts.

But I have had some of his outspoken opponents on the Hill tell me "off-the-record" (perhaps with an unspoken "except me" reservation): "I don't know of any one who could have done better under the circumstances."
