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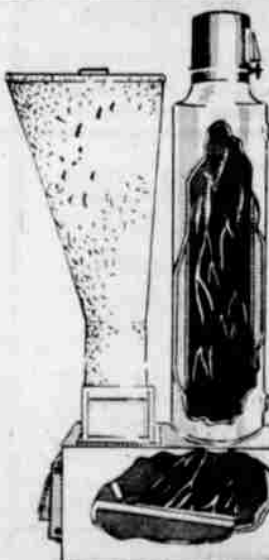

Dock Dispute Arbitrator Decides for Employers

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11.—(AP)—An arbitrator decided in favor of the employers today in a waterfront dispute, and union officials were debating what action to take.

The CIO Supercargoes and Checkers Union walked out of the arbitration hearing March 30, and officially advised the arbitrator, Dr. Blair Stewart of Reed College, that it would not be bound by his ruling.

Stewart ruled today that employers, not the union, have the right to determine how many supercargoes, supervisors, and checkers should be employed on a ship.

PORTLAND, April 11.—(AP)—Inman-Poulsen Lumber Company, whose resaw plant was destroyed by fire Tuesday night, reopened today.

Only the resaw division, which employed 60 men, was not operating. Officials said it might take four months to replace all the destroyed machinery. Damage was estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000.

The company said, however, that virtually all employees would be kept on the job.

Waste Wood for Feed Is Suggested

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 11.—(AP)—A chemical engineer today suggested utilization of waste wood products as food sources to cope with a "shortage" of proteins in the United States.

Declaring there is a shortage of 20,000,000 tons of proteins in foods available to the nation's people, poultry and livestock, Dr. Robert T. Aires, of New Haven, Conn., told the American Chemical Society this "could be partly offset by recovering proteins from pulp paper mill wastes."

He told the chemists that in addition to 150,000,000 pounds of yeast and cattle fodder which can be produced annually from pulp wastes "a practically inexhaustible amount can be made from sawdust, wood waste and unsalable wood."

Field director of the Northeastern Wood Utilization Council, Dr. Arajes said a waste-utilization project, besides producing high-protein food from waste liquors discharged annually into the nation's rivers and streams, "would reduce stream pollution and thus curb the annual loss of fish from this cause."

Nation's Use of Flour May Be Cut One-Fourth

June 30, when the new winter wheat crop starts moving to market in volume.

The British cabinet offered yesterday to ration bread in Great Britain if the United States would do the same.

Rationing Improbable
But Anderson made plain that consumer rationing of either bread or flour during the present emergency is out of the question because, he said, rationing machinery could not be set up in time to help.

He emphasized, however, that he did not mean to imply that rationing might not be necessary later. He explained that the future possibility of rationing of bread, meats and other foods depends on this year's food production.

Similarly, Anderson's view that this country will meet its promises abroad assumes that the government will be able to pull to market the bulk of the remaining small stocks of wheat on farms. Officials have reported that many farmers are holding on to their grain in the hope of higher prices.

Record Crop Looms
Lending greater encouragement to the cabinet officer, however, was the department's crop report predicting that this year's winter wheat crop will be a record one.

Government plans call for greater emphasis on the wheat conservation program started a month ago and upon other measures designed to curb use of wheat in non-food uses.

The conservation program, which was outlined by President Truman's famine emergency committee, called upon Americans to eat 40 per cent less wheat products during the present emergency.

Other measures to be pressed more vigorously, Anderson said, include orders limiting use of wheat in livestock feed, prohibiting the use of wheat in making beer and whiskey, a higher wheat flour extraction rate, and limits on inventories of millers and feed mixers designed to prevent hoarding of wheat.

Anderson promised an investigation of reports that beer is being exported by countries receiving relief shipments of grain.

NEW YORK, April 11.—(AP)—Bread prices will rise as a result of the government's plan to cut bakers use of flour by 25 per cent, Faris R. Russell, chairman of Ward Baking Co. said yesterday at the annual stockholders meeting.

The flour supply cut will so reduce the business of the country's 20,000 small bakers, Russell said.

Three Major Parties Close in Japan's Vote

new political party, probably a coalition, with Shidehara as its head.

Communist Heads Win
Tokuda, secretary general of the Communist party, who led a 14-man committee into Shidehara's office Monday to demand the premier's immediate resignation, was one of the Communists definitely elected. Another was Party Leader Nosaka, who recently returned from exile in Yanan and was one of the most personally popular of all candidates in Tokyo.

The close race led to immediate speculation that a tri-party coalition would organize the next cabinet.

Early returns indicated a 72 per cent national vote.

Among the Social Democrats elected was Katayama, the party's secretary-general.

Ousted Man's Wife Wins
The first two candidates assured of victory were Mrs. Satoko Togand, 38, of the People's party, and 87-year-old Yukio Ozaki. Mrs. Togano's husband had been ousted from the Diet by General MacArthur's political purge. Ozaki, who had served in every Japanese parliament in modern times, recently permitted himself to be quoted as favoring the Communist-sponsored democratic front, but ran as an Independent.

Mrs. Shizue Kato, formerly the Baroness Ishimoto, a well-known prewar birth control advocate, led Tokyo's Second district. She ran on the Social Democratic ticket. Her husband an officer of that party, was running second in Ise Prefecture.

Many Japanese voted for General MacArthur in yesterday's balloting but election officials declined to report the figure.

One voter wrote in "I mean this seriously."

Military Backing For Peace Forming

NEW YORK, April 11.—(AP)—In the quiet of a penthouse atop a midtown hotel, some 20 men are laying down plans for organization of a military force which ultimately may develop into the most powerful the world has ever seen.

These experts, moving with all the caution and secrecy their job demands, compose the military staff committee of the United Nations.

As the military organ of the security council, the committee members make up a general staff for the world's international police force whose task will be to prevent and, if need be, suppress aggression.

In the words of the U. N. charter, their duty is to "advise and assist the security council on all questions relating to the security of armaments, and possible disarmament."

An indication of the wide latitude that eventually will go to this small group of men can be seen in the charter provisions giving the security council full power to use armed force to give effect to its decisions in cases where it considers that such measures as severance of diplomatic relations, economic relations and communications have failed.
