Mat Bill Offers Fans Hot Action

Douglas county wrestling railbirds have established Jack Kier and Anthony Martinelli as favorites to win the team match here at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night—the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly mat show.

The four-man skirmish, a wrestling extravaganza that matches the "battle royal" for dynamic action, will be the final event of the evening—following two 30-minute, one-fall matches that should start the evening off with the right tempo.

Taking the mat at 8:30 o'clock will be Martinelli and Angelo—and although they are fellow countrymen, no love is lost when they tangle. Martinelli is a longtime favorite here but since Angelo's invasion of the northwest several months ago, the chunky grappler has been battering his way through the most formidable kind of opposition.

Kier, who was the youngest matman ever to hold the coast light-heavy championship some five years ago, will need all of his speed and agility to evade the rough-and-tumble tactics of Kenaston. The villain from Gold Hill, who is a typical tough ex-Marine, makes no bones about his mat classification. He is an out-and-out meanie and will have the advantage over Kier on this score, plus size and probably strength.

Fans are urged to make early reservations, because the show is expected to attract a crowd equal to last week's record-breaking mob.

A BACKLOG OF BONDS

Residents of Douglas County hold \$7,093,706 Series E War and Savings bonds, accumulated between May 1941 and December 1, 1945, according to a report from the Oregon War Finance staff.

Douglas County residents are not through buying Savings bonds. In fact, it is quite evident that many persons formed a habit of systematic savings they do not propose to discard, for in February 1946 they bought bonds of all types, amounting to \$55,735, as compared with \$113,899 in February 1945, when bonds were still being promoted to finance the war.

Douglas County was one of the leaders in bond sales throughout the war, and was of material aid in procuring for the State of Oregon, first place in per capita sales, amounting to \$446.02 for every man, woman and child, \$11.26 more per capita than second place Connecticut.

Every Oregon resident who participated in establishing that history making achievement has the right to be proud, and every Douglas County resident who invested to the limit in bonds should be elated by this county's record.

Members of the county's war finance staff received their "honorable discharges" at a meeting held in Roseburg Wednesday, when Treasury Department citations and Silver Awards were presented in appreciation of leadership and service in the war finance program.

While these honors were conferred upon eight individuals, they were, in effect, tributes to every man, woman, and child who sincerely and patriotically supported the bond campaign. It would not have been possible for Harry Fargeter, who bears the distinction of being one of the very few county chairmen in Oregon to serve continuously throughout the war period, to accept the praise bestowed upon him, had it not been for the cooperation and support given by the public as a whole.

Thus while certain men have been singled out for special mention and honor, because they were fortunate enough to be chosen for places of leadership, tributes to them are, in actuality, a showing of appreciation to every participating individual.

Men and women who have served as leaders, either on a county-wide scale or in respective communities or districts, have accomplished more, however, than simply helping meet the cost of war. Douglas County residents have accumulated a reserve amounting to more than \$7 million, while banks, municipal bodies, etc., hold a slightly larger amount. This great reserve is insurance for the future, and many people are showing particularly good judgment by continuing their programs of systematic savings, indicating that they appreciate use of the government's financial program to continue accumulation of reserve funds.

Release of war bonds by purchasers has been at an exceedingly low rate. In fact, national leaders have been amazed by the way American people are clinging to their bonds. In the great majority of cases in which bonds have been cashed, it has been determined that the bonds were accumulated for a definite purpose, such as construction of a home, purchase of an automobile, washing machine, etc. Surveys show that the majority of those who did not buy bonds with a certain project in mind are planning to hold their savings. Some are buying on a definite plan, including a schedule for reinvestment, to accumulate an old-age retirement fund.

We have completed a program of war financing with a grand flourish, a record which so-called financial experts predicted was impossible. While engaged in that program, we have learned we can improve our individual financial positions, insure protection for the future, and attain a measure of freedom from fear of want. It is to be hoped our education in thrift will continue to bear fruit.
