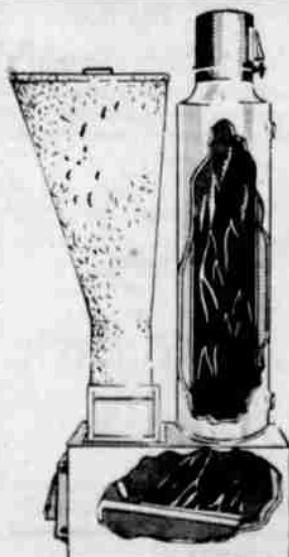

T. W. Thomason, Policeman, Dies

Theodore W. Thomason, 65, life-long resident of Douglas County, died after a long illness at his home on North Jackson Street last night. He was born April 25, 1879, at Glendale, Oregon, and except for three years spent in Eugene, Oregon, he lived his entire life in the Roseburg community. For the past 11 years he had been a member of the Roseburg police force, serving eight years as special merchant policeman. He was a life-long member of the First Baptist Church.

Surviving are his wife, Emma, Roseburg, the following daughters: Mrs. Garold Madison, Elkton, Ore.; Miss Evelyn Thomason, Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. Kenneth Wilmer, New York City; Mrs. Richard Fies, Roseburg; two brothers, Lee Thomason, Dorena, Ore.; George Thomason, Salem; three sisters: Emma Guthrie, Roseburg; Belle Zimmerman, Eugene; Mollie Chase, Marysville, Calif.; and five grandsons.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Roseburg Funeral Home Monday, April 15, at 2 P. M., with Rev. H. P. Soine officiating. Interment will be in the Masonic Cemetery.

Truman Vows to Carry On New Deal Battle

tional cooperation, Mr. Truman declared, "we are determined to fight with all our strength."

Mr. Roosevelt's domestic policy, he continued, was "a recognition of the basic truth that this government exists not for the benefit of a privileged few but for the welfare of all the people."

Mr. Truman linked up his own domestic program with the New Deal legislation for which he said Mr. Roosevelt fought, asserting: "Those same principles apply to legislation assuring full production and full employment, legislation for a health program, a social security program, an educational program, a program to provide emergency housing for veterans and to solve the long-range problem of decent homes for all Americans. These and other progressive measures stem from the principles which President Roosevelt fought, for which we, who are carrying on after him, now fight, and for which we shall continue to fight."

Mr. Truman declared that plain people all over the world join with leaders and statesmen in recognizing that it was largely because of Mr. Roosevelt "that civilization has survived," and added that "only history can do him full justice."

"He recognized, above all," Mr. Truman continued, "that the hope for the future of civilization, for the future of life itself, lay in the success of the United Nations. He not only recognized these truths. He determined to do something about them. And he did."

"His foreign policy called for fair, sympathetic and firm dealing with the other members of the family of nations. At the same time it recognized our obligation to the starving and homeless of other lands."

The New Deal, Mr. Truman said, became the realization of "the great hope" which "in an hour of extreme crisis" Mr. Roosevelt gave to the American people.

Its principle, he said, "have today become an accepted part of our way of life."

"When an employee joins a

union, when an investor buys a share of stock, when a man buys a house or a farm on credit, when he puts the money in the bank or grows and sells his crops, or gets cheap electricity, when he lays aside part of his income for unemployment or old age insurance, those principles are right there by him—and on his side."

In accepting custody of the Roosevelt estate as a national historical site, Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug stressed that it will be shared by people of all nations.
