E. C. Apperson, Oregon Financier, Passes Away

McMINNVILLE, Ore., April 15.—(AP)—Edwin Clyde Apperson, 75, who in January resigned as president of the Oregon Mutual Fire Insurance Company after almost half a century of active leadership in banking and financial affairs in this community, died after a brief illness Saturday.

He was elected treasurer of Linfield College in 1933 and was a member of the board of trustees at the time of his death.

His widow, a son, Norwood C. McMinnville, and a daughter, Mrs. Charles G. Robertson, Astoria, survive.

Ten Persons Hurt When Troop Train Strikes Bus

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15.—(AP)—Ten persons were injured, two critically, early today as a northbound troop train struck a Portland Traction Company bus at a crossing in the southeast part of the city.

All the injured were Portland residents, occupants of the bus. Traffic Investigator W. A. Green said no one aboard the train was hurt.

The bus driver, Byron A. Logan, 29, was taken to a hospital unconscious and his condition was believed critical. The other

seriously injured person was Charles E. Normand, 46. Green said the bus was dragged 475 feet.

Snell Cites Need Of Forest Safety

SALEM, Ore., April 13.—(Special)—Further pointing to the need for a vigorous forest fire prevention campaign this summer, with fire hazard increased due to greatly stepped up tourist travel through Oregon, Governor Snell today cited Keep Oregon Green as vital public service for all citizens.

Governor Snell called upon nine newspaper men, officers and directors of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' Association, to act as a spearhead committee to carry the message of the statewide Keep Oregon Green into every city and town in Oregon through the state's newspapers.

In the five years since the founding of Keep Oregon Green in 1941, the newspapers of this state have given magnificent support, the Governor pointed out, and this constant attack by editors and reporters against man-caused fires has been so successful that nationwide attention has been attracted to our work.

By cutting forest and range fires to an all time low, our natural resources have been saved; jobs have been protected, and continuing payrolls have been insured.

Trout Season To Open on April 20

PORTLAND, April 15.—(AP)—The trout season will open throughout Oregon except for Lake and Harney Counties on April 20, with more than a million just-released fish in the state's streams.

F. B. Wire, state game supervisor, predicted the best fishing in coastal waters. Present indications are for fairly water in the Deschutes and other Central and Eastern streams.

Added to the fish supply are 63,300 steelhead, 553,000 rainbow trout, 76,000 cutthroat trout, and 488,000 Chinook salmon, released this spring from hatcheries. The bulk of liberations will be made this summer and fall.

The bag limit for trout six inches or longer is 15 pounds and one fish in a day; 30 fish weighing not over 30 pounds and two fish in a week.

The Oregon State Game Commission Saturday ruled that it lacks authority to declare an emergency and close the Willamette River to sports angling.

The State Fish Commission several weeks ago told the game body the spring salmon run was threatened. It recommended closure for several days weekly to assure adequate escapement.

The Game Commission said its decision was based on a 1945 at-

torney general's opinion on closure of the Wilson River.
