Chiefs of Navy Shift Over to Merger Plan

he added that the form unification should assume is something still to be worked out. Forrestal's reference to "unification" contrasts with the original Navy position that while there is a need for an overall coordinating structure, unification of the Army and Navy into a single command is neither necessary nor helpful.

The Navy delegation, Forrestal told the newsmen, gave Mr. Truman its views on the question. A Senate military subcommittee has drafted a bill proposing a "department of common defense" which would contain the separate but coordinated arms of the Army, Navy and air force. The measure contains much of what the Army and the President had requested as well as some of what the Navy had offered in its counterproposal for a "national security plan." This latter suggested including foreign policy as well as military planning in any general organization.

Congress Not to Be Hasty While Forrestal's post-conference talk with White House newsmen indicated some of the tension was eased and an agreement between the services nearer, the possibility of immediate Congressional action remained remote. Several lawmakers have let it be known that any merger legislation is in for protracted committee attention.

The long-standing dispute took on a rougher character last week when Mr. Truman rapped out an anti-merger lobbying he said was being done by admirals and others in Navy. But it was Mr. Truman who made the first public move to clear the air. Meeting reporters again yesterday, he said he did not think either Forrestal or Nimitz had been lobbying.

In reply to other questions he said what really stirred him up last week was an interview by some admiral in Hawaii. After several hours of confusion, it developed that the officer the President had in mind is Admiral Merrill, commander of the eighth naval district with headquarters at New Orleans.

Prison Sentence Meted To Female 'Husband'

TACOMA, April 18.—(AP)—Margaret Hurst, who by her own admission masqueraded as a man and married an 18-year-old Tacoma girl last month, was ordered committed to the state penitentiary today by Judge F. G. Remann in Pierce county superior court.

The commitment was ordered by the judge as he revoked suspension of a 15-year sentence which the 29-year-old Puyallup woman was given on a conviction for grand larceny and forgery last February.

Red Cedar Lumber Goes Up in Ceiling Prices

SEATTLE, April 18.—(AP)—Increases described as averaging \$4.50 per 1,000 board feet in mill price ceilings for western red cedar lumber were authorized by the OPA last night. Effective April 22, they will offset higher log and labor costs, a spokesman said. They may be passed on at all sales levels.

Motorists Find Way to Beat Limit on Parking

PORTLAND, April 18.—(AP)—Traffic Engineer Fred T. Fowler reported today that hundreds of

motorists leave their cars all day in front of the same parking meter, feeding it another nickel every hour.

He reported that if the cars remained only one hour, 33,360 cars could have been accommodated where only 22,613 were actually counted.

Under regulations, automobiles are supposed to stay only an hour in a meter parking spot.

Bus-Train Crash Death Toll Increases to Two

PORTLAND, Ore., April 18.—(AP)—The toll of Monday's bus-train collision rose to two today with the death of Byron A. Logan, 29, Portland, driver of the city bus.

Charles E. Norman, 46, bus passenger, died several hours after the accident. The other eight injured persons are expected to recover.

Wage Increase Sought By Vancouver Employees

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 18.—(AP)—A petition asking a 16 per cent wage increase for all city employees was before the city commission today.

Vancouver's firemen and policemen, who circulated the petition, stated that the cost of living had risen 31 per cent since 1941 but salaries only 15 per cent.

Freight Train Kills Brakeman at Portland

PORTLAND, April 18.—(AP)—Harry Hight, 46, Northern Pacific railroad brakeman, was killed by a freight train's wheels last night while his own train waited for him to signal a go-ahead.
