

Truman, Despite Mistakes, Would be Party's Nominee Today, Commentator Finds

WASHINGTON — Standing on the threshold of President Truman's second year as chief executive and predicting his political future on the basis of his accomplishments and mistakes in the first year is anybody's game of mental tiddly-winks.

In a year as president he has become the man of the party—a leader when a leader was lost. Whole sectors of the Democratic party may disapprove of Truman's policies, may vote against his legislative program, but if the Democratic national convention were held today, the squabble would be over naming the vice presidential candidate, just as it was in the second, third and fourth nominations of President Roosevelt.

Proves He Can Take It

On the credit side of his political ledger, President Truman has demonstrated in his first year a terrific energy, an ability to stand up under tremendous responsibilities and fight them through. His personality is not dominating like that of his predecessor, but it is genial and infectious. Become as angry with his acts or his views as you choose, it is almost impossible to dislike Harry Truman.

From the moment Truman took office, he showed a frankness that is almost unknown to Washington and politics. On occasion, this has gotten him into trouble and as the year progressed, he became more cautious. Now, he often drops back on the Presidential prerogative of "no comment." But it still is a rare thing when he indulges in the kind of meaningless double-talk so many politicians

resort to when the going gets rough.

Although some of his appointments must go on the debit side, many of the major ones have met with considerable approval. Like Roosevelt, President Truman is likely to let his intense loyalty to his friends get him into political hot water, but loyalties beget loyalties, and no politician lasts long without loyal friends.

Whether Congress acts or doesn't, President Truman has his platform ready for 1948 and many of those points have the same appeal to the mass of voters that President Roosevelt's programs had.

Main point on the debit side has been President Truman's mishandling of Congress. The legislative branch has given him the brush-off and his half-fellow attitude towards his former cronies has left him without a weapon with which to strike back. Congress is likely to continue his political dilemma during the next two years.

NEW YORK, April 18.—(AP)—Soviet Russia was reported today to have lost a strenuous battle behind closed doors to have the United Nations security council's procedure experts rule against further consideration of the Iranian case.

As the council prepared to meet, the committee of experts on rules and procedure was said by informed quarters to be split eight to three, with the majority holding that the case could legally be kept on the agenda.

The council was expected to resume its debate on the controversial Spanish question at the opening of the session.
