B. P. W. C. DISTRICT CONFERENCE HELD HERE OVER WEEK-END

The district conference of Southern Oregon of Business and Professional Women's Clubs officially opened last Sunday morning with registrations at the I. O. O. F. hall. Mrs. Isabelle Brixner, Klamath Falls, president of the Southern District presided at the meetings. The morning session began with the welcoming address of the hostess club, Roseburg, by its president, Miss Ruth Roberts. The highlight of this session was a forum panel on "Program Building and Adaptation" led by Mrs. Kathleen Miller of Albany, first vice president of the Oregon Federation. The forum consisted of Ellen Upp of Klamath Falls, Lucille Lenox of Medford, Sylvia Wise of Grants Pass and Alvia Wetherall of Roseburg. General conclusion of this discussion was that a national program is compiled by experts, that it is generally elastic enough to adapt to its general form the individual needs of each club and its community and still conform to the original plan; that to follow a common general plan helps maintain state, national and international unity and policy. It was emphasized that more can be accomplished by working with rather than in competition with the men's service clubs and other service, social or civic clubs, although this aim is constant, it is important enough to bear repetition for effect.

The group adjourned for church attendance, many going to the Presbyterian Church where a special sermon had been prepared and invitation had been extended to the clubs. A large, enthusiastic representation from the local club as well as visiting clubs assembled at the Rainbow Grill for the "Membership Luncheon." At this time Mrs. Lowell Russell, new member of the Roseburg club, entertained with some very lovely musical numbers. Mrs. Russell, who possesses a lovely, trained voice, sang for her first number, the familiar "Indian Love Call" with its accompanying Indian sign language. This number was followed by several selections sung in the native Indian language with the sign language accompaniment.
