PENDLETON, Ore., April 19. — (AP) — An aged woman was fatally burned and her grandson seriously injured in a home fire here early this morning.

Police Chief C. E. Lemons said neighbors told him Mrs. Anna Belle Engleman, 75, had been in but dashed back inside suddenly when she remembered something she wanted to rescue.

Flames had so thoroughly engulfed the home by that time that it was impossible to rescue her he said.

The police chief said her grandson, young Engleman, rushed from the building with his clothes flaming, and some neighbor grabbed a blanket and smothered the flames.

Other members of the household escaped injury but the house and its contents were completely destroyed.

The car was at the sixth floor. Irwin was pronounced dead at emergency hospital early this morning.
