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Liska Pitches 0-0, Seven-Inning Win Over Hollywood

Fancy pitching fashioned the windup of the Pacific Coast League's fourth week of baseball engagements this season and left the San Francisco Seals in command, with the Los Angeles Angels tagging along a game behind.

Leading the parade with his right-handed fire was 38-year-old Adolph (Ad) Liska, who for 20 years in organized baseball, and half as may as a Portland Beaver had an ambition to pitch a no-hit game.

He did it in a seven-inning nightcap Sunday at Hollywood, shutting out the Hollywood Stars, 1 to 0, and allowing only two walked men on base. The Beavers won the first game, 4 to 3.

The San Francisco pace-makers got their victory for 18 wins in 22 games in a morning 5-2 drubbing of Oakland, but the Oaks came back in the afternoon on the one-hit hurling of Ardiola to shut out the Seals, 4 to 0.

Jonas of Seattle delivered one-hit pitching to down San Diego, 1 to 0, in a seven-inning finish after the visiting Padres had beaten Seattle, 2 to 1, in the opener. Los Angeles split a twin bill with Sacramento, occupants of the basement. Sacramento took the first game, 3 to 1, cracking a ten-game winning streak, and the Angels slugged out a 14-4 rejoinder. Six of the Angels' straight wins were in the seven-game series with Sacramento.
